

My dear Mr. Lipps:

Your letter of the 5th inst. advising me that one of your Winnebago boys had proposed marriage to Minnie Onhand, has been received. Minnie is closely related to the family of Fred Lookout, Principal Chief of the Osage Nation, and I sent for Lookout and his wife this morning and communicated to them the information conveyed in your letter. They requested that I write you immediately and express their unqualified approval of the course you are taking. They do not say that they would unalterably oppose Minnie's marriage to a young man of another tribe, though they confess to me that it would be rather disappointing for Minnie to fail to find her life-mate among her own people. They want Minnie to come home as soon as the session closes, and to come home single, even though she will not be heart free.

They want her to have a little time to reflect over the step she now contemplates and they want the reflections to be uninfluenced by the presence of her wooer. If, after this period of reflection, it is evident that Minnie's happiness rests on an alliance with the Winnebago brave, they will give the girl away, admit the bridegroom to full fellowship in their home circle, and lift up their hearts in prayer that every blessing may attend the happy pair.

CERTIFICATE OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN.

I hereby certify that on July 9 - 1911, I made a careful examination of the physical condition of Mamie Onhand (as soon after arrival as possible.), the child named in the foregoing application, and found her to be perfectly sound physically. (Very early case of Trachoma)

I therefore recommend that the said child be now enrolled in this school.

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

## INDORSEMENTS.

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The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

*Provided,* That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.
