SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school shall be furnished with the original of this form for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the office of the superintendent in charge of the reservation. The Reservation Superintendent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer. 6-870

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Dear Sir:

I desire to report that Maggie Hardin has been giving the matron continuous trouble during this entire year, beginning with her having been sent in from the country for misbehavior. The matron has patiently endeavored to get this girl to mend her ways but to no avail. Maggie is not only a bad girl herself, but her influence on the girls in the quarters is such as to make her an undesirable pupil here.

I do not like to have her expelled for incorrigibility, and have this blot on her record, and I write to ask that the funds be placed to her credit to pay for her transportation home. It occurred to me that possibly she might have funds with you or that her parents could supply these funds.

She is a young girl and possibly this lesson will not be lost on her. It may be that after a period of time she will have resolved to behave herself and can again attend a Government school, but if it becomes necessary to expel her, this privilege will be forbidden.

I regret that the moral conduct of the two Hardin girls has been such as to make it absolutely necessary for the welfare of the girls in your school that these girls be sent away from Carlisle. The Hardin girls should have appreciated the opportunity afforded them at Carlisle and have conducted themselves in such a manner as to have set a good example for girls of more Indian blood rather a bad one. I will fully explain this to their oldest sister.

As stated in my telegram this morning, Julia and Maggie Hardin cannot be kept here any longer. A great deal of the trouble at this school during the past three months is a result of Julia's misconduct last summer, and she has continued to cause just as much disturbance since then as she has been capable of causing. Maggie was mixed up in some immoral happening some time ago, and under the circumstances it is absolutely necessary that both the girls be sent home.

The new policy at Carlisle will be to admit only those students who come for a purpose and who prove by the work they do that they are willing to benefit by every opportunity that is offered them.

It is deplorable that girls like the Hardin girls have to be turned out, and that there is nobody except their sister to care for them, but here at Carlisle other girls have come under their influence and it is no longer advisable to
