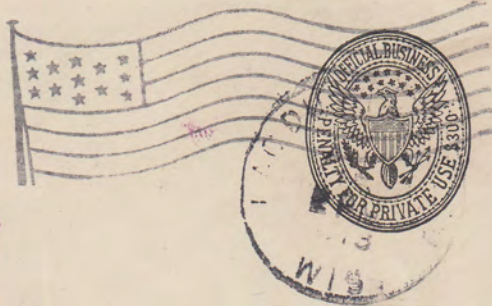
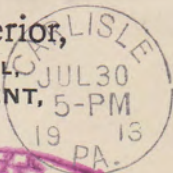

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school shall be furnished with the original of this form for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the office of the superintendent in charge of the reservation. The Reservation Superintendent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer. 6-870

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

up to the beginning of last week, or

she went for a short walk in
the afternoon and got back around
nine o'clock. Since then I have kept
her close until this afternoon when

hour. They have not returned and
it is now nearly nine.
Louise has given me more trouble than

Dear Mr. Friedman:

The following is relative to Louise Spott and Mary Martin. Both left their homes on Sun. P. M. July 27th with permission to take a walk from 3 to 4. Louise previously had given trouble so Mrs. McCordell was unwilling to let her go but she promised most faithfully to be back at 4 o'clock. The girls failed to return. They met two boys from Camden, spent two hours with them in the Park, and then the boys leaving them at 5 o'clock, the girls spent the rest of the night in the park, and the following Monday in the woods near Mrs. McCordell states Louise stole \$1.50 from her home.

By reading the inclosed letters which were written by Louise Spott you will see their intentions were very low. Through the unstamped letter left by Louise Spott, Mrs. McCordell located one of the boys and under threat of arrest made him promise to tell where the girls were. He said he had received a letter that Monday asking him and his friend to meet them (the girls) and if Mrs. McCordell would promise not to have him arrested he would send the letter. She made him promise to deliver the letter in person. This is the stamped letter which shows both girls expected to meet the boys at night.

With the help of Mr. Dickey, Mr. Potter and Mr. Underwood, (inform Mary Martin's home) the girls were caught Monday night as they came out from the woods to meet the boys who were there (under threat of arrest).

Louise Spott is a bad girl with bad intentions. She was mixed up in a deal with Mabelle Brunette and Lucy Smith (expelled) last winter. She promised to make good "if given a chance" under the Outing. She made a failure after being out a few weeks. The whole of this can be reviewed from the report at that time. In short she had a "white boy" from Carlisle to call on her.

She was given another chance in the same home she has been guarded by Mrs. McCandell who has had to be on the alert every minute. Louise constantly told lies and during the week previous to her desertion slipped out twice to make dates. Once on Sunday, July 20th and the following Wednesday. The girls met these boys at a lawn party, on Sat. July 19th, given by the Catholic Church which both girls attend. The girls were in charge of Mrs. Potter's family but somehow managed to meet the boys and make a date for Sunday.

Louise proved too much for Mrs. McCandell. She should have the severest punishment. To be expelled is what she would like, I believe. Glen Mills would not be too severe for her for a girl of her caliber is detrimental to Carlisle and Carlisle interests. I believe a whipping would have its effect if not her it would as an example.

I would not trust her in Collingwood that night so suggested to Mr. Dickey that he take her to City Hall where she would spend the night in a cell. When I called to see her on Tues. A. M. she was insolent in her manner, refusing to take her gum from her mouth while talking to me. I sent her back to her cell and spoke no more.

Mary Martin was led into this affair by Louise Spots. Mary has never been away from the Potter home in the evening unchaperoned since she has been with them. She has been obedient and helpful to Mrs. Potter who had only good words for her and was willing to take her back. I took Mary back to Mrs. Potter's home, had her undress, after our talk, and in her night gown gave her a whipping. Besides this punishment she is to be deprived of her $\frac{1}{4}$ for spending for Aug., and all her letters must pass through Mrs. Potter's hands.
