SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.


Replying to your favor of June 8th, in regard to Cicero Crittenden, the Acting Chief Resident Physician of the General Hospital reports to me as follows:

Cicero Crittenden was admitted to the Men's Venereal Ward 6-3-14 suffering with Neisserian infection. On 6-5-14 he requested his discharge which was granted. His short stay precluded the possibility of curing his ailment.

It is quite true that he was placed in a large ward with others who are being treated for Venereal diseases. We have no small or private wards so that it was impossible to place the young man anywhere other than where he was placed.

There is fifteen dollars which has just been turned over to me by the Acting Chief Resident Physician. If you will advise me what to do with the fifteen dollars, or to whom I shall send it, I shall be only too glad to comply with your instructions.

My dear Mr. Worsham:

I regret to report that there is nothing else we can do for your ward, Cicero Crittenden. On June the 2nd he was taken to the Philadelphia General Hospital, the only public institution that would admit him, but several days later he returned to Carlisle with a tale that he became frightened because of the other men who were confined to the same ward with him.

After much effort it was finally arranged to have him admitted to a private Hospital in Harrisburg and on June the 8th he was taken to that institution.

This forenoon it was reported to me by telephone that Cicero had run away from the Harrisburg Hospital and since then he has again arrived here. For safe keeping and to keep him segregated he is now confined to our school guard-house. He states positively that he will not go to any other Hospital and that he does not care whether he gets well or not. Under the circumstances I do not see how we can keep him here or how we can co-operate with you further in taking care of him.

Since the receipt of your letter of June the 22nd Cicero Crittenden has been seen at my office. He again stated that he will not remain in any Hospital and that he does not care whether he gets well or not.

In view of his attitude, and because there is no one available who could be detailed to guard him at a Hospital as you suggest, I must insist that he be taken away from this school. He is a menace, the other boys know about his disease and shun him, and those who have come into closer contact with him than I have have expressed a belief that he is mentally deficient. Under the circumstances there is nothing more that can be done for him here and I hope you will let me hear soon just when he will be taken away.

Your letter under date of June 11, 1914, subject amount of deposit at this office to the credit of Cicero Crittenden, who was admitted to the Venereal Dept. of this Institution, 6/3/1914, received.
