SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school shall be furnished with the original of this form for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the office of the superintendent in charge of the reservation. The Reservation Superintendent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer. 6-870

## INDORSEMENTS.

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The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

*Provided*, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Referring to the letter you addressed to our Dr. Allen on December the 9th, this is to advise that arrangements have been completed for your daughter Mary to enter a Philadelphia Training School for Nurses. The Government will not authorize an expenditure of the amount required to pay for her transportation to Philadelphia and at least \$3.08 will be required to cover that cost.

I will also advise that the Government will furnish all necessary articles of clothing required by Mary, but as this does not include the finer articles so dear to the heart of every girl it should really bring Mary a great deal of pleasure if you can let her have a little more than is required for her fare to Philadelphia. If you desire that the expenditure of what you send shall be supervised it may be forwarded direct to me.

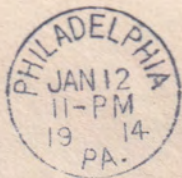

I'm very sorry, Mary. You have spoiled your training, with that "blemish" and sincerely hope nothing will occur again in like manner, either there or elsewhere. If it had of been necessary it would of been different. Yet the act was uncalled for in any way.

And in the hospital - the remuneration you receive is to cover all such expenses, not, to pay you for your work, as your training is supposed to be that equivalent.

But it's not altogether the value of the books - but the act, and not

only concerns yourself, but - the wrong  
influence you sent out to the other  
two girls Edith and Cora

Cora was quite open about it, in  
a way. merely asking Edith to "swipe"  
her books too. You girls don't know  
how sorry I am, in a way. Yet  
I hope you'll all profit by it, and  
remember, you can't make "trained  
nurses" out of girls, that can't be  
trusted even in the "least" of things.

Our class motto, (and I feel  
sure your class has just as good a  
one) was taken from the Bible: "He  
that is faithful in the least, will be  
faithful also in much" and I  
know there was not a one of us  
that didn't aim to live up to it  
as near as possible:

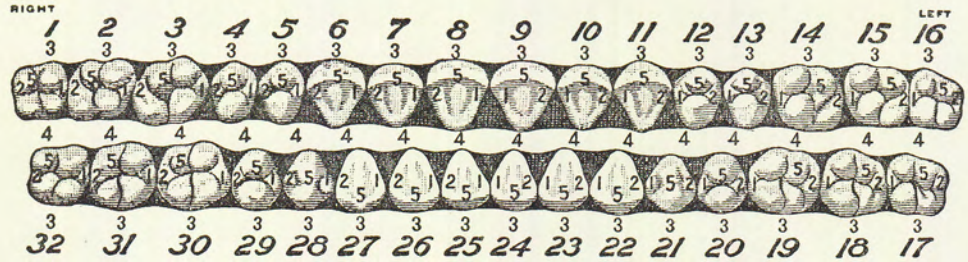
