SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.— Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

My dear Sir:

I will take this opportunity to report to you that arrangements have been completed for Nancy Coleman to leave from her home at West Chester for her mother's home under your jurisdiction. She is being provided with an amount that it would have cost to provide transportation for her passage from Carlisle to Fla.

I understand that Nancy desires to return to West Chester some time in the summer so that she can take up her studies there in the fall, and although the ruling made by the Office some time ago forbids your giving her official assistance it would be appreciated if you could extend her personal encouragement if an opportunity presents itself.

I have been informed that Nancy has made a splendid record here and that she is worthy of any assistance that can be given her in spite of the fact that she is a negro girl and not an Indian girl.

My dear Friend:

Immediately upon receipt of your letter of June the 14th the matter of making a part of the cost of your transportation available was taken into consideration with our local ticket agent and it is being arranged so that you will have credit at West Chester for an amount of \$16.60 to apply to the cost of your transportation from West Chester to your home. The amount of \$16.60 would be the cost of your transportation from Carlisle to Fla, North Carolina, and you are entitled to that sum because your period of enrolment at Carlisle has terminated.

In this connection I beg leave to call attention to a question that has arisen in the minds of our local ticket agents regarding the mileage book you claim you can use. They are of the opinion that you have been misinformed and that you cannot procure mileage of any kind that can be used south of Washington. Therefore, before you purchase a mileage book it will be well to have it understood definitely whether it can

be used as you now anticipate. It is also doubted that you could procure an excursion ticket for use to your home and back again to Philadelphia, so be sure that you are advised definitely before you start on your journey home. The credit that is being made available at West Chester may be applied to any kind of transportation you can use.

Herewith I enclose a check for an amount of \$8.04, which represents the entire balance to your credit here. I should like to see it for a larger amount, because I am informed by those here who know what a struggle you have made to realize your ambitions that you are worthy of having had an easier time. However, the very fact that you had to work hard for your education must be of value to you and will make you all the more capable a worker when your school days are over.

Because of the splendid effort you have made to get an education I have taken the liberty to ask one of the Trustees of a fund we have here to help worthy girls to draw a check for an amount of \$6.39, which is due the Normal School for books and similar incidentals. A bill had been sent here for consideration but it was not returned to me by the Trustee and so you will have to get a duplicate receipted when you use the check I also enclose.

This favor is extended you to show our appreciation of the very good work you have done, and some time in the future when you have time to earn more money a similar amount may be sent here for deposit with the other amount in the fund and from which other girls can then be helped.

I trust you will not have any difficulty about arranging for your transportation and that you will have a very pleasant summer, from which you can return to your school work to complete it with credit to yourself and those who are interested in you.

Dear Mr. Lipps:

To-day I transferred Estelle Red Star from the home of Mrs. Frank Rossiter, Glenside, Pa. to Mrs. Fred Rapp, Lancaster, Pa. Mrs. Rossiter gave me a dollar for Estelle's work for her since last Friday - this dollar I used for Estelle's transfer. Trunk transfer at Glenside 25¢. R.R. Fare Glenside to Phila. 30¢; Trunk transfer Phila. to Lancaster 50¢.

We will not have another girl at any time for Mrs. Rossiter. Mrs. Rapp was very glad to receive Estelle who is "green" but willing to be taught.

On Monday, I went to West Chester to plan for Nancy Coleman. Found upon my arrival there that she had already made other plans and which she had written to you, viz. - that she be allowed to go home on June 13th - and she intended coming back July 1st to work in Frankford. In Sept. she expected to again apply for admission to the Normal - not in connection with Carlisle however. When I went to see her I had hopes of placing her with Mrs. Rapp but Mrs. Rapp objected to her going home the last two weeks in August. So when Mrs. Rapp had the opportunity to-day of taking another girl she did so. When I left Nancy on Monday night it was with the understanding she would do what ever you want her to do except she insists upon going home the last two weeks in August - no matter where she is.

I'll see that party to-morrow also and will select the best for Matilda. I have another sea shore name on my list. They applied some time ago so I judge we can fix Matilda all right for June 15th.

I saw Julia Cornell on Monday and hope there will be a marked improvement. There is great room for improvement in her.

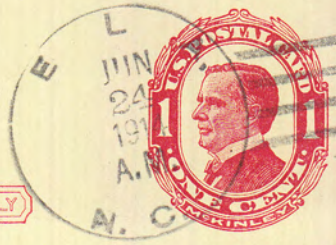
