SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Dear Sir:

Robin Dougherty, a nineteen year old Cherokee boy who was brought here by his guardian, Mr. F. B. Worsham of Stilwell, Oklahoma, the latter part of May, has made a satisfactory record at this school. He has been respectful, obedient, and has worked faithfully in our Tailor Shop. However, when school work began on Tuesday Robin refused to go to school. When he was questioned about the matter he stated that he simply did not want to go. He has also "balked" in his work since then and all efforts that have been made to have him see the importance of doing one or the other have failed. He cannot give any excuse for his actions and has stated that he does not know what he wants to do.

He cannot be punished for taking such a stand, because he would not be benefitted by any such action.

Under the circumstances it is my belief that there is nothing at all that we can do here for Robin. I have made it my personal business to have two long heart to heart talks with the young man since yesterday, but I have failed to reach him.

I have appealed to him to give the school work just a week's or a month's trial, or to state that he wants to devote all his time to the learning of some trade, but it seems he has just come to the point where he does not want to do anything at all, though he knows well enough that he is making a mistake by not trying to co-operate in carrying out the suggestions that have been made to him.

Herewith I enclose a copy of the telegram that went forward to you this morning, and if you do not have any suggestion to offer that might assist in reaching him in some way I must insist on his removal from Carlisle.

Robin is too bright a fellow to take such a stand, and I have failed to see how he can persist in not yielding to the appeals that have been made.

My dear Mr. Worsham:

This reply to your letter of August the 7th has been so long delayed because there seemed to be reasons to believe that Robin Dougherty was mixed up with several other boys from the Five Tribes in bringing whiskey to the school. It has been learned, however, that Robin was evidently not connected with the affair in any way.

Herewith I enclose a copy of a letter to the United States Indian Superintendent at Muskogee which will explain in detail the good opinion I have of Robin and the attitude he has taken this week. I must state that I fail to understand the boy, because he is far too intelligent a fellow not to know that he is making a mistake. However, as stated, if he will not decide what he wants to do there is nothing more we can do for him here.

Policeman Roach of the Union Agency is now in Washington, but at Superintendent Kelsey's request he will probably return to Carlisle within a day or two. Three unfit

fellows from the Five Tribes are to be sent away with Mr. Roach and it is my suggestion that you arrange at once with Superintendent Kelsey so that Robin can be taken away at the same time.

I regret very much that such a stand has to be taken, because I have become interested in Robin and because I believe that there are possibilities in him.

I enclose herewith my check for an amount of \$67.18, which is the balance to the credit of Cicero Crittenden. No charge has been made for his tuition and care during the time he was at Carlisle.

Dear Mr. Lynch:

Referring to your letter of the 7th instant relative to the expense of the removal of Robin Daugherty from Carlisle, Pennsylvania to Lebanon, Tennessee, you are advised that these expenses have not yet been paid.

This matter was presented to Mr. Worsham when he was in this office. Mr. Worsham thought since the tuition was paid so far in advance, that Robin should have some credit on this tuition, and if such credit was extended it would doubtless be sufficient to pay this expense.

The superintendent deposited the tuition in the United States Treasury when it was received, and has submitted a claim for the unearned portion thereof. It may be some time before this matter is settled and there is no assurance that it will be refunded.

The claim for rail road fare and other expenses is long past due and Mr. Lipps feels personally responsible.

Mr. Lipps has been very accommodating to this office in admitting boys of the Five Civilized Tribes, and since the removal of Robin to another school was occasioned by his own misconduct, it is believed that this small expense should be forthcoming at once, thus saving Mr. Lipps the embarrassment in which he is placed by having this bill remain unpaid.

If it is possible to secure a refund of the tuition, Mr. Lipps will forward such refund to the guardian upon receipt thereof. I would therefore request that you secure the amount due from the guardian of Robin Daugherty, Mr. Woreham, in the sum of \$24.67, in the form of a bank draft payable to O. H. Lipps, at the earliest possible date, and forward it to this office for transmittal to Mr. Lipps.

The amounts due from the other three boys have all been paid without any objection, and it is believed the guardian in this case should be willing

My dear Mr. Parker:

In further reference to the matter of the claim that was made by Robin Daugherty's guardian for a refund of that part of Robin's tuition which was deposited in the Treasury of the United States and not benefitted by on account of the young man's unfitness to continue his enrolment at Carlisle, I submit below for your information a copy of a self-explanatory letter that was addressed to me from the Office at Washington on the 14th of March:

"The Office has received your letter of March 1, requesting to be advised in the matter of refunding to the guardian of Robin Daugherty part of Robin's tuition fee.

It is assumed that the tuition paid by this young man in advance was deposited in the Treasury as required by law and that full advantage was not taken by him of the privileges purchased. Therefore, the Office does not see a valid claim vested in him merely because he failed to reap full benefit from the contract for tuition, which amount is available only for the same purposes as the appropriation. It will not be possible to refund any part of the amount paid by him unless an error was made, which is not the fact in this case. Class IV

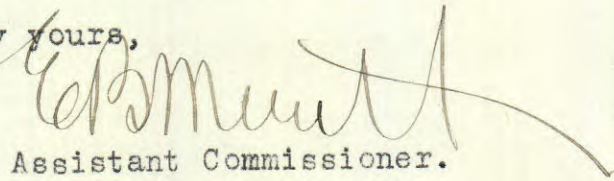
My dear Mr. Lipps:
