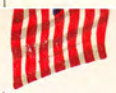

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school shall be furnished with the original of this form for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the office of the superintendent in charge of the reservation. The Reservation Superintendent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer. 6-870

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

My dear Sir:

I submit herewith a copy of "Proceedings of A Court-Martial" that was convened on April the 6th to try John Broughtplenty and John Martin for the crime of having entered our Girls' Dormitory. On April the 10th I was authorized by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs to have the young men placed in a State Reformatory or expelled from this school.

In view of the fact that both the young men have already reached the age where they would probably not be received at a reform institution I have decided to expel them, and in accordance with the Office's policy in similar instances heretofore they should pay for their transportation from their own funds. I would thank you, therefore, to send me what is required to pay for John Martin's transportation home. He is also known as John Squirrel and his home is at Waweacumig.

On June the 23rd of 1914 you forwarded here an amount of \$20.00 to apply to the indebtedness that had to be incurred to send John Martin to his home. As \$3.00 of that amount was used to cover the charge for cash that was advanced John there is yet on deposit here a balance of \$17.00.

As the amount is not sufficient to pay for the ticket that was purchased for John's use, I would thank you to advise me whether the balance due may be expected. If it seems advisable to return to Chief Wah-we-yay-cumig what is being held here your recommendation to that effect will be complied with and the charge against John will be allowed to go thru as a Government charge.

My dear Sir:

Fearing that the continued confinement in our School Guard House may be detrimental to the health of John Martin, because previous to the 6th of this month he had trained very actively as a track athlete, it has been decided best to send him home at once. Accordingly, it has been arranged for him to leave here this evening and transportation to Ogema will be provided for his use.

The cost of the transportation will be charged to the account of this school until an amount of \$50.63 can be sent to me to pay for the same, as was requested in my letter of the 16th inst. I am also advancing him an amount of \$3.00 with which to pay for incidental traveling expenses enroute home, so that a total of \$53.63 is required to pay for all expenses incident to his trip.

My dear Sir:

This is to acknowledge receipt of your favor of the 18th instant, with which you forwarded a check in the amount of \$8.00 to apply to the balance due on the cost of the ticket that was provided for John Martin's use when his removal from Carlisle had to be effected. It is also noted that the remaining balance of \$8.63 may be expected next month.

In view of John's complaint that he was overcharged for the ticket that was provided for his use, your attention is invited to the letter I had addressed to you on April the 20th of 1914. The cost of the ticket was \$30.63 and an additional amount of \$3.00 had to be added thereto to cover the amount in cash that was given John for incidental expenses. As a total of \$20.00 was sent here by Chief Wah-we-yay-cumig in June of 1914 there is due but \$5.83 more from John. The error in reporting to you on December 14th that a total amount of \$16.63 was yet due was the result of not taking into consideration the fact

that the amount of \$3.00 had been deducted from the amount of \$20.00 sent on, leaving the balance of \$17.00 on deposit here to apply to the cost of John's ticket, which was \$30.63. It will be necessary, therefore, to send but \$5.85 to settle the entire indebtedness.

Noting further in your letter that John believes there is due his brother James an amount of about \$31.00 that was deposited to insure his return to Carlisle, this is to advise that out of a total of \$95.00 that was deposited jointly by the Martin boys on June 13th of 1913 when they went to their home an amount of \$61.22 had to be paid for their tickets. An amount of \$30.54 was expended on December 16th of 1913 to pay for the ticket that was provided for John's return to Carlisle and that same date an amount of \$3.24 was handed to him in cash.

This will acknowledge receipt of your favor of the 7th instant, enclosing a check in the amount of \$5.83 to cover the balance of the sum that had to be expended to send John Martin ^{Squirrel} to his home when his release from this school had to be effected in 1914.

Noting further that the young man now protests against an expenditure of \$30.54 that was charged to his account in December of 1913 because he had been assured by Mr. Warner that the cost of his return transportation would be paid from funds to the credit of the Athletic Association, I must call attention to the fact that John evidently was willing that such a charge should be made because that very date in 1913 the remaining balance was handed to him in cash. The entire transaction was closed before I took charge at this school and I fail to see how I could do anything to justify the return to him of an amount he claims should not have been charged.
