INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Dear Mr. Lipps:

On August 6th, I visited Hannah Kennedy who was committed to Sleghton Farm, a reform school for girls, on June 5, 1913.

Mrs. Falcomer, Superintendent, gives an excellent report for the conduct of Hannah. They have an honor system in their cottage homes and at one period Hannah was "Mayor" of her cottage. She fell from "grace" and was demoted. Mrs. Falcomer tells me she will again beat the head as she is very ambitious.

In industry she leads in handicraft, particularly lace-making. She is very musical but lacks "application to practice."

Mrs. Falcomer informs me that the Cumberland County Court committed Hannah to this reform institution for two years. Her term expires in June 1915. At that time she may be placed out on parole as she is under the control of same institution until she is twenty-one years of age. She is now eighteen years old.

Mrs. Falcomer says she will be glad to co-operate with Carlisle in regard to any plans for Hannah's welfare.

The letter inclosed is one written by a sister of Hannah's. Very little has been learned concerning Hannah's parentage. It is not known definitely that this is a sister of Hannah's. This letter is to be returned to Mrs. Falcomer.


It is noted that Hannah Kennedy will be eligible for parole early in June, at which time she can be placed in the charge of Miss Mary T. Scheurman, of Waterbury, Connecticut, Secretary of the Organized Charities. The Office feels that the parole of this girl in the care of a proper person who will have her best interests at heart is very desirable.

Mr. Matthew K. Sniffin, Secretary of the Indian Rights Association, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, has this day been advised of the facts concerning the commitment of Hannah Kennedy and her eligibility for parole, and of the desire of the Office to cooperate in the matter. It has been suggested to him that Miss Scheurman correspond directly with you in order that there may be no delay in comply-

ing with the various formalities which the institution
may require.

You are directed to act with Miss Scheurman in
procuring the parole of Hannah Kennedy in her care.
