Dear Madam:

Upon receipt of your letter of the 24th ultimo, regarding the wages received by your daughter, Melissa, will say that I instructed Miss Johnston, one of our employees whose duty it is to look after the girls who are in "Outing" homes, to visit Melissa and find out the reason for your complaint. This is Miss Johnston's report.

"As for Melissa Anderson will say that when I visited her she looked well and strong. The family consists of three adults and the work in that home is not heavy. Melissa was asked if she had any complaint to make about her home and she said that she had no complaint to make except that she thought that she was not getting enough pay; that her cister was getting more than she and she was larger than her sister." Miss Johnston tells me that Melissa's sister is a better worker in every way, and is worth more than Melissa. Then another thing, Melissa is in a home where the work is light and the family small so that there is no need of paying high wages. The girls that we send out and who get high wages are those who are quick, capable, and know how to do all kinds of work, and are neat in their appearance. Melissa has shown since she has been here that she is not on time for roll-calls, -that means she is not quick at her work --- very careless in her habits and in many other ways we would not recommend her for higher wages than she is getting unless she proves herself capable to earn more. Money is not the only thing considered in our "Outing" homes. We place them in homes where they will learn the ways and manners of the best class of white people; where they will be treated as one of the family and learn how to do things in a refined and dignified way. We place the girls in homes where they will learn how to be refined and quiet, not loud and boistrous and rude. The things that Melissa will learn in this home will be worth more to her than money because the money will soon be spent and the knowledge she gains in this home will go with her always.

#### INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.
