INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

My Friend:

I have your letter of the 7th instant in regard to your desire to enroll as a pupil at Haskell Institute. I note that you say you once filled out an application for Haskell when you were a little boy; that you have just returned to your home from the Carlisle school where you have been in attendance for nearly two years; that you were called home on business and that you and your parents have decided that you may not return to Carlisle but will go elsewhere; also that you are twenty-three years of age and have been married.

In reply I have to state that as it appears you did not complete your term of enrollment at Carlisle, we could not, under any circumstances, consider your application until you are fully released by that school. Again, under the rules we are not permitted to enroll any pupil past the age of twenty-one years excepting by special authority of the Indian Office for good and sufficient reasons, which must be satisfactory.

Of course, as you say, an excellent education is a fine thing and should be sought by all our Indian young people

where practicable. However, in your case, in view of what you say about yourself, it is my belief that you are very well equipped and should settle down and make practical use of the training you have received. Effort and ambition will count for much even though opportunity and education may have been lost.
