For and in consideration of the United States assuming the care, education, and maintenance in the United States Indian School at Carlisle, Penn., of William Mixmoug, Male, I, Jasper Mixmoug, father, of Charlevoix P. O., State of Michigan, do hereby voluntarily consent and agree to his enrollment in said school for a period of three years, and also obligate and bind myself to abide by all the rules and regulations for Indian schools.

I further say that the said child was born at Cross Village, Mich. on Sept. 12-1896; that the father, Jasper Mixmoug, is Full blooded Indian of the Ottawa Tribe located at Charlevoix Agency; that he left the tribe about ; that the mother, Mary Ann Mixmoug, is Full blooded Indian of the Ottawa Tribe located at Charlevoix Agency, and left the tribe about ; that the said child was born and reared in the United States, and now actually resides therein; and that he has attended the following schools:

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

My dear Sir:

Upon receipt of your letter of May the 26th, in which you call attention to a report that had come to you regarding the condition of your son William, it was at once referred to our School Physician with a request that he make an examination. I submit below for your information a copy of the statement that was issued this morning by the Physician:

"William Mixmong's condition need excite no alarm. He has tuberculous glands of the neck, one of which supurated and was opened. I am keeping him here so that he may receive the best of care. Please reassure his father."

Under the circumstances it seems not at all necessary that William should return home at this time on account of his health, and as every care is being given him it is hoped a more favorable report can be made soon.
