

My dear Mr. Little:

This is to report that shortly after Joe Muggins arrived at this school it was recommended by our School Physicians that he be sent to Philadelphia for an examination by Dr. Fox, a noted eye specialist who is considered one of the very best in this country. Dr. Fox reported as follows:

"He has chronic inflammation of the cornea, which cannot be cured. Under treatment he might be improved a little, but that is doubtful. I should think his home the best place for him, as it is impossible for him to study sufficiently to obtain an education."

Soon after Joe's return from Philadelphia he was given permission to devote all his time to work in our Shoe Shop, but about a week ago it was recommended by our School Physician that he discontinue even that work. Joe is now assisting with the work in the quarters, where the strain on his eyes will be comparatively less than in any other school activity.



I transmit herewith for your information two copies of proceedings of a court-martial that was convened at this school on April the 21st, last, to try Joe Muggins for serious offenses. Will you please have one of the copies delivered to Joe's father for his information?

On May the 8th the findings of the court were approved by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and in accordance with the authority given on that same date Joe is being expelled from this school. He will leave here this evening with transportation for his passage to Valentine.

Believing that Joe should not have been sent here in the first place, and that it is only fair that he should pay for his transportation home I would thank you to assist in collecting an amount of \$25.85 that will be required to cover the amount yet necessary to pay for the ticket. An amount of \$6.00 due Joe is being retained here to apply on the cost of the ticket when the amount specified above is received thru

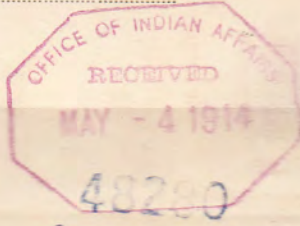

Pursuant to the foregoing order, the court assembled at the place, date and hour therein specified. Present the following members:

All Commissioned officers

The recorder and accused were also present.

The accused was then given opportunity to introduce counsel, *but declined to do so.

The order convening the Court was read by the recorder, and the accused was asked if he wished to object to any of the members, to which he replied

*Counsel must be selected from employes or students of the school only, and if introduced and accepted by the Court, the record should then read: "The court assenting, the counsel appeared and took his seat" and the word "but declined to do so" erased or red lined.

The members of the Court were then severally duly sworn by the Recorder, and the Recorder was duly sworn by the President of the Court, all of which oaths were administered in the presence of the accused.

The accused was thereupon arraigned and tried upon the following charges and specifications:

CHARGE Being in town in citizens' clothes and without permission from Disciplinarian.

Associating with negro and white women of low and immoral character and indulging in fornication with them.

Satying all night with one Hazel Myers a notorious bad character in the negro section of Carlisle.

SPECIFICATION:

In that the said Joe Muggins has associated with women of low character on the streets of Carlisle and has gone constantly to a house occupied by one Lily Stackfield, a Negress of low and immoral character and that he has practiced fornication in this house with her, which fact he acknowledges himself.

That on the night of April 20, 1914 he went in company with one John Baer, another Indian student to a house occupied by one Hazel Myers and another woman and that they stayed all night in this house, Baer and the girl occupied one couch used as a bed and he another couch used for the same purpose in the same room and that the girl and he had immoral relations during the night.

All of these facts and more he acknowledged to the Disciplinarian in the presence of another Indian student.

That he has been constantly going to town without permission and for bad purposes.

To which charge and specification the accused pleaded as follows

To the Specification: Guilty

To the Charge: Guilty

to object to any of the members, to which he replied
The recorder and accused were also present
The accused was then given opportunity to introduce counsel, but declined to do so
The order convening the Court was read by the recorder and the accused was asked if he wished to object to any of the members, to which he replied

As the ticket will probably be charged to the account of this school it will be necessary to file an application with me to cover Joe's transfer.

I will also call attention to the condition of Joe's eyesight, which seems to be so very poor that his transfer can hardly be considered justifiable, and which seems to have been good and sufficient reason before this not to approve an application for his enrolment.
