SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Dear Mr. Young:

After my letter of February the 25th had gone forward to you Ethel Greenhair came to me stating that she had become anxious about her grandmother's condition and because of the grandfather's frequent absence from home would like to go home sooner than was specified in my letter.

Believing that the girl should be favored because of her desire to be of assistance at home I have consented to let her go. At her request arrangements are being completed to have her leave here tomorrow evening and a ticket good for her passage to Winnebago will be procured for her use.

In view of the fact that Ethel's period of enrolment has not terminated and there is really no reason why the government should be charged with her transportation it has been agreed by her to pay for the ticket from her own funds. She has more than \$300.00 to her credit here on which she will draw.

Dear Mr. Lipps:

Ethel Greenhair it appears from our records entered Carlisle in March, 1910. John Pelkey who appears to be one of our better Indians is her grandfather. He says that Mrs. Good Old Man, Ethel's grandmother, signed for her with the idea that she was to stay three years. Through some misunderstanding it proved to be five years instead of three and it seems that the five years will be up next month. The grandmother is not in good health and is anxious to have the girl returned in the latter part of March if not inconsistent with your rules. Probably your rules do not count the fraction of the year in which she entered, but since there is a misunderstanding I feel that the girl should be allowed to come home at this time since, if she is held, it will make the grandmother feel that good faith is not being used. It will be hard to explain to her why the girl does not come at the end of the five year period. I leave this to your judgment and sense of fairness.

Dear Mr. Young:

I have noted with care the contents of your favor of February the 18th relative to the desire of Mrs. Good Old Man that her granddaughter, Ethel Greenhair, be returned home as soon as she has completed her five year period of enrolment the latter part of March.

According to the Indian School Rules Ethel should not be allowed to return home until the close of school in June, but because there has been a misunderstanding and the weakened old grandmother could not be made to understand why Ethel should not return at the end of the five years regardless of rules governing the matter I agree with you that it will probably be the advisable course to take to release the girl next month.

Ethel has been advised to that effect and arrangements to have her leave at that time will be made. You will be notified at a later date when the girl may be expected at home.

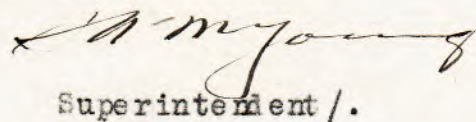
