For and in consideration of the United States assuming the care, education, and maintenance in the United States Indian School at Carlisle, of Nelson D. Simons, male, I, Ella F. Simons (Name of child.) (Sex.) (Parent, guardian, or next of kin.) of Mashpee P. O., State of Mass, do hereby voluntarily consent and agree to the enrollment in said school for a period of five years, and also obligate and bind myself to abide by all the rules and regulations for Indian schools. (Not less than 3.)

I further say that the said child was born at Mashpee on April 12 1890 (Date.) that the father, Isaac Simons (Name of father.) Was a 1/2 Indian of the South Sea Tribe located at Mashpee Agency; that he left the tribe about 1905 (deceased) (Approximate date.) that the mother, Ella F. Simons (Name.) is a 1/2 Indian of the South Sea Tribe located at Mashpee Agency, and left the tribe about lives here now; that (Approximate date.) the said child was born and reared in the United States, and now actually resides therein; and that he has attended the following schools:

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### INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

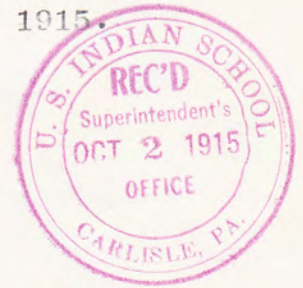

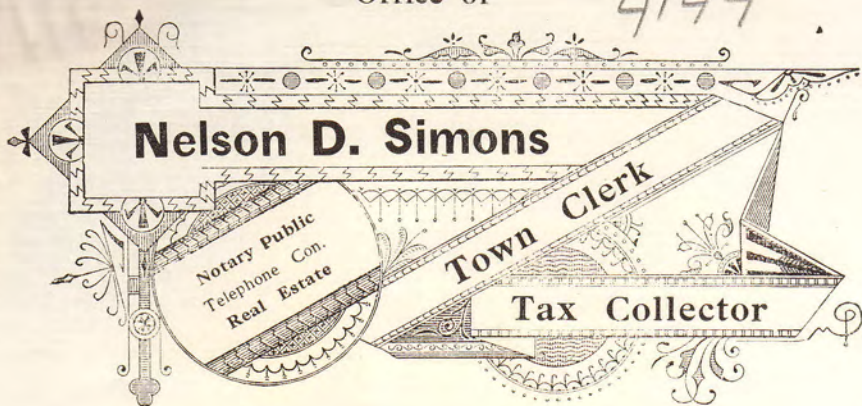

The reason that I am so interested in those in the lower grades is because they live so far from the school and their parents are not what they should be to them, in regards to encouraging them, etc., and from my own observation, I feel very safe in saying, that, if they got the proper training at the right time that they would make good men and women later in life.

Realizing from my own experience, I think that they should be encouraged and helped as much as possible when they feel inclined to make themselves useful, and I have no other object in view only to see them do well; so trusting that you will give this matter your valuable consideration, I am,

My dear Nelson:

I have received the applications for the enrolment at Carlisle of four of your friends whom you recommended some time ago. The information contained therein has been noted and it is believed that they should prove to be as good students at Carlisle as they have evidently been in the school in which they have completed the course. However, for your further information I must state that no later than last week it was directed by the Indian Office at Washington that I send to their homes students now enrolled here who live near public schools, even on Indian reservations in the West.

In calling attention to rules that should govern me in selecting students for enrolment here there was noted a paragraph as follows:

"Pupils who have been enrolled in public schools for a considerable period, should not be accepted for enrolment in Indian schools except under very exceptional circumstances."

In view of the fact that so recent a decision by the Office lays down rules which would govern directly the consideration of the request for the enrolment at Carlisle of your friends I must state to you that I do not see how I could possibly cooperate with you to bring them to Carlisle.
