I went to the McCurdy home in Jenkintown and learned that they have been in Wildwood, N. J. for two weeks. I tried to the chief of police at Wildwood also telephoned to Pennsylvania where Mamie had lived formerly.

Mr. Friedman,

Dear Friend:

Our breakfast hour on Sunday morning is 7:30 so made in order that Mamie could leave her kitchen in order, and get to church promptly at 10:30. This she has done without any trouble since she came. Yesterday morning when Mr. Love went to the bathroom, he found a note from Mamie saying that we would not have breakfast before 8 o'clock as she was going to early church. She didn't return all day. My daughter has been ill and I took her away for a few days, leaving Mamie in charge, my son and Mr. Love in the house, and oldest daughter across the street. We supposed she had gone to visit some of her friends, of which she seems to have several among your partons in this vicinity. Miss Carrie went to her room and found a note to herself, we will enclose copies of both. My son telephoned at once to you, he was told you were out, so he reported the matter to the matron. She has taken some of her clothes, since she made complaint to you, that she was not satisfied we have paid her \$12 a month, not because she was worth any such price, but because we did not wish to make any change, until the regular time. Some one she was living with before she came here, and of whom Mamie seems very fond, has offered her very high wages to come back and I think that is what has dissatisfied her. We found her always kind and polite and most willing to do whatever she was told. The meals were neither cooked or served as we would like, but always promptly on time. She wasted a great deal of time and I think never darned a stocking from the time she came, as the feet were about gone. Miss Carrie is not at all strong and I am about half invalid. She certainly has served us an intolerably mean trick.

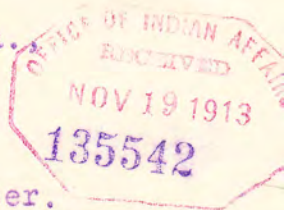
