Your letter of the 17th instant came duly but I have been so busy arranging for boys and girls to go out into country homes that I have not had time to write to you.

I asked Mr. Dickey, our Boy's Agent, to look around a place for for/your boy in some auto shop and he has done so. The result is that we are not able to find such a place as you want for your son. The garage people say that they can get all the help they need for board only --- not paying any wages. We have one boy in a garage in town who boards at the school and gets 20.00 a month, but he has been there two years, and is more of a helper in the garage rather than a mechanic. It seems to me that if your boy knows so much about a machine as you say that the best place for him is in some trades school where he can study the manufacture of machines and further his knowledge along that line. At the present time he is out on a farm under the Outing, and his employer writes that he is not worth his salt on a farm to work. I thought you would be interested to know this about your son. I know you

would want him to be a success at any kind of work. I am sorry that I cannot find such a place for your boy as you want.

I am enclosing you the ticket used by Mr. Martindale of this office who escorted the pupils - Mary Lieb, Lincoln Levering, Edna Levering, Newton Robinson and Elizabeth Janis - from Walthill to Carlisle. Mr. Martindale did not go further than Harrisburg, Pa. when after putting the children aboard at Harrisburg for Carlisle, he returned home.

In case/the ticket which was issued to Charles Warner on October 5, 1914, I am enclosing two affidavits made by Roy Warner who used the ticket as far as Ashland, Nebraska (65 miles from Walthill); that he lost the ticket at this place and was compelled to pay his fare to Omaha and return to Walthill.

Harvey Warner who gave me the double cross explains the matter thus: That he had intended when he asked me to have the ticket released for Charlie to let

Roy go to Carlisle on it, and pay Charlie's fare a little later himself. This explanation is at least partially true. However, the real reason for Harvey Warner's letting Roy sign Charlie's name to the ticket at the Burlington Rail Road station at Walthill is that Roy had become infatuated with an Indian woman older than himself, whose husband had left her, and his father in desperation was willing to go to extreme ends to separate them. I hope that this explanation to-gether with the affidavits will enable you to satisfactorily adjust the matter with the Railway Company.

In regard to the five dollars which Roy obtained last April to cover his incidental expenses on his return to his grandfather's funeral, Harvey Warner requested me to ask you to inform the Office here if Roy had any money on deposit at Carlisle. In case he had, he would have Roy endorse the check for \$5.00 payable to you which he received from your Office July 2, 1914, otherwise he would pay the amount to you either direct or through this office. I regret that the question of the disposal of the railway ticket should consume so much time but we have pushed the matter as fast as circumstances would allow us.
