



My dear Sir:

I thank you for your favor of November the 19th, containing detailed information relative to the transportation that was furnished your Mr. Martindale and to Mr. Harvey Warner.

Regarding the amount due for the latter ticket. I cannot see any other way to adjust the matter than for Mr. Warner to send a check at once to cover the cost of the ticket that was issued to him. He must realize that the ticket was secured under somewhat peculiar circumstances in the first place and that he is responsible for the cost of it. I believe the case should be brought to his attention at once in no uncertain terms so that immediate payment can be made.

This is also to advise you that Mr. Warner's son Roy has to his credit in our school bank an amount of \$15.65. Inadvertently you were advised in October that Roy did not have any money to his credit when his return home was effected, and just as soon as his father can get the matter

referred to above adjusted a check for the balance to his son's credit will be forwarded to you.

Mr. Warner's inquiry relative to the check that was sent to him for his son's signature in July seems to be rather an unusual one, and the fact that he has not given the matter his attention before this time indicates that he cannot have been very anxious to co-operate in settling for the amount that was advanced to his son. I would thank you to assist in securing the five dollar check that requires Roy Warner's signature and to advise me how soon the amount required to pay for the ticket secured by Mr. Warner may be expected.

My dear Sir:

I am enclosing you the ticket used by Mr. Martindale of this office who escorted the pupils - Mary Lieb, Lincoln Levering, Edna Levering, Newton Robinson and Elizabeth Janis - from Walthill to Carlisle. Mr. Martindale did not go further than Harrisburg, Pa. when after putting the children aboard at Harrisburg for Carlisle, he returned home.

In case^{of} the ticket which was issued to Charles Warner on October 5, 1914, I am enclosing two affidavits made by Roy Warner who used the ticket as far as Ashland, Nebraska (65 miles from Walthill); that he lost the ticket at this place and was compelled to pay his fare to Omaha and return to Walthill.

Harvey Warner who gave me the double cross explains the matter thus: That he had intended when he asked me to have the ticket released for Charlie to let



Roy go to Carlisle on it, and pay Charlie's fare a little later himself. This explanation is at least partially true. However, the real reason for Harvey Warner's letting Roy sign Charlie's name to the ^{receipt for} ticket at the Burlington Rail Road station at Walthill is that Roy had become infatuated with an Indian woman older than himself, whose husband had left her, and his father in desperation was willing to go to extreme ends to separate them. I hope that this explanation to-gether with the affidavits will enable you to satisfactorily adjust the matter with the Railway Company.

In regard to the five dollars which Roy obtained last April to cover his incidental expenses on his return to his grandfather's funeral, Harvey Warner requested me to ask you to inform the Office here if Roy had any money on deposit at Carlisle. In case he had, he would have Roy endorse the check for \$5.00 payable to you which he received from your Office July 2, 1914, otherwise he would pay the amount to you either direct or through this office. I regret that the question of the disposal of the railway ticket should consume so much time but we have pushed the matter as fast as circumstances would allow us.

All the papers sent the office are returned herewith.


