My dear Sir:

I have received your letter of the 1st instant and must state in reply thereto that on January 12th of this year I had communications as follows addressed to you at Fort Washakie and to Supervisor Peairs at the Indian Office in Washington, respectively:

"Complying with Supervisor E. B. Peairs's request that I write you direct in regard to the amount of money you sent last July to pay for your son Tony's transportation home, this is to state that at the time Tony desired to go home the funds for use in paying for this year's transportation were not yet available. When the money was received here from you I supposed, of course, that you were entirely willing to advance the sum so that Tony could return home just as soon as he desired to go, and that the matter was settled.

Inasmuch as a number of students have already been required to pay for their transportation to Carlisle this year on account of limited funds which can be used to pay for transportation it would be a difficult matter to justify the expenditure of an amount required to effect a reimbursement of the amount you advanced to pay for your son's ticket, especially because he had been enrolled for but two years of the five year term for which his re-enrollment was entered in 1912.

Will you let me hear from you again in regard to your request to be reimbursed?

-2- Mr. John La Jeunesse.

"I am having enclosed herewith a copy of the letter that has been addressed to Mr. John La Jeunesse at Ft. Washakie, Wyoming, as was requested in your favor of January the 4th from the Sherman Institute.

I beg leave to state that Mr. Lajeunesse's letter to you was not found enclosed with your favor as you stated, but it was inferred from the copy of your reply to Mr. Lajeunesse's letter that he desires to be reimbursed for an amount he advanced to pay for his son Tony's return home last July when official funds were not yet available to pay for transportation. Tony's period of enrolment had not terminated and it is a question whether he was entitled to such special consideration even at that time. When I hear again from Mr. Lajeunesse the matter will be considered further."

I yet believe that Tony's transportation should have been paid by you because his period of enrolment at Carlisle had not terminated when he insisted on going home, and as it has been a most difficult matter to accomodate students this year who were entitled to receive transportation at government expense I could not well recommend that you should be reimbursed for what was really a personal favor to your son. However, if you have additional reasons to present why the reimbursement should be effected let me hear from you.

My dear Sir:

Complying with Supervisor H. B. Peairs's request that I write you direct in regard to the amount of money you sent last July to pay for your son Tony's transportation home, this is to state that at the time Tony desired to go home the funds for use in paying for this year's transportation were not yet available. When the money was received here from you I supposed, of course, that you were entirely willing to advance the sum so that Tony could return home just as soon as he desired to go, and that the matter was settled.

Inasmuch as a number of students have already been required to pay for their transportation to Carlisle this year on account of limited funds which can be used to pay for transportation it would be a difficult matter to justify the expenditure of an amount required to effect a reimbursement of the amount you advanced to pay for your son's ticket, especially because he had been enrolled for but two

Replying to your letter of June 22, 1914, regarding the return of Tony Lajeunesse to his home on account of the condition of his eyes, I have to advise you that it is believed that the funds required to pay for Tony's return can be collected from his people but they feel that as he is to be returned on account of no misconduct on his part he should be returned at the expense of the school.

If possible so to do, I recommend that you return Tony without expense to his people, especially as Dr. C. H. Dewey will be here after August 1st. If it is impossible to return him at Government expense I will endeavor to raise the necessary funds from his family.
