SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

My dear Mr. Kohut:

Having read the letter you addressed to Mr. Charles Coons at this school on May the 15th, I take the liberty to state that during the fifteen months I have known the young man he has impressed me as being a splendid leader for boys because of his quiet manner and his ability in athletic activities. He is a clean young man and does not have the bad habits so common even among the better class of young men.

I do not have any personal knowledge of his ability as a canoeist, but am advised by Charles himself that he learned to handle canoes while he lived with his parents in the lake region of Wisconsin. He is probably out of practice, but I do know that at his home a greater majority of the Indians spend a great deal of time on the lakes and that much of their subsistence consists of the wild rice they gather by the use of birch bark canoes on the lakes. I should not hesitate to believe him efficient in that spec-

My dear Mr. Snyder:

I am writing you in behalf of Charles Coons, who is to leave Carlisle this evening to enter upon duty at the Santa Fe School.

The young man has had several seasons of training in physical culture work under excellent instructors at the Chautauqua School in New York State and has had an opportunity to put his training into practice as an assistant to the instructor in physical culture work at this school and at times in full charge of the work. He has also had experience as assistant disciplinarian at our Large Boys' Quarters and in handling boys in track work, basket ball work and similar activities, so that he comes to you well fitted to take care of boys.

Referring to your telegram of the 5th instant this is to state that Charles has not been trained as a band leader, but he plays an instrument and should be an addition to your band in the capacity of a player.

I must call attention to the fact, however, that he is yet a young man and that it will probably be to his advantage

My dear Mr. Francis:

Your letter of July 24, inclosing a communication from Chas. Coons is received.

It is rather surprising that the young man should write to Carlisle after the events which transpired after April 13, the date of his first letter to me asking to be placed in an automobile factory. He resigned from Pierre the last of May, after the Office had telegraphed him to remain where he would have an increase of salary. He then went to Toledo, Ohio, and was placed in the Overland factory. The Overseer reported that he was hard at work and apparently satisfied.

On June 28, Charles surprised me by asking by wire to be appointed Overseer, in place of Mr. McGillis, who was resigning for war duty. He does not inform Carlisle that I have given him an opportunity in the Overland factory, where many Indians are profiting by the experience.

I shall be glad to give the young man another chance in one of the Detroit factories, and inclose carbons of my letters to him and to the Overseer, regarding the matter.

When the young man reports to you for duty give him another trial in one of the factories at Detroit. Before placing him, however, you should find out why he left the Overland factory, and ask him to give you some assurance that he will "stick to his work", and not give up on amere pretext.

For your information, Indians are placed in the Ford factory only by the Superintendent of the Carlisle Indian school after completing a preparatory vocational course at the school.

My dear Friend:

It was rather surprising to receive your letter of July 11, forwarded to me by the Superintendent of the Carlisle Indian school.

You failed to write me that you were leaving the Overland factory at Toledo, where I placed you at work, early in June. After your many letters promising to stick to your work I was surprised to receive your telegram asking appointment as Overseer. Surely you did not leave the Overland factory to go to Detroit without employment in view!

You have been disciplinarian in three schools in less than two years, and have entered and left the Overland factory within a month. If you really mean business the first requisite is to buckle down to work and remain in one place long enough to make a record.

I am deeply interested in the career of all boys of Indian blood, and my life is devoted to furthering their interests in every way that in me lies, power to work for their benefit. I hesitated a long time before placing you in an automobile factory and finally did so because you repeatedly wrote me that you could stick at a job as well as anyman and would do your best to make a success of the work. And I shall be very glad to give you another opportunity, this time in Detroit since you are living in that city. When you are ready to go to work you may report to Mr. Eugene McCauley, Overseer, at 104-1/2 Englewood Avenue. You will be placed in a good factory where promotion will come to you as your ambition and ability and effort warrant. All I ask is that you be candid with me. Write me of your troubles and I may be able to smoothe out the difficulties and adjust matters for your advancement, and, on the other hand that the interests of your employers may be subserved.

SUGGESTIONS FOR SUPPLYING THE INFORMATION REQUESTED ON THIS BLANK

1. The report of nonreservation school Superintendent should be made at the time or a little before the pupil leaves school, whether at the end of the school year or during the school year, provided the pupil is 18 years of age or over, or younger, if for any special reason the pupil is quitting school permanently. As soon as this report is received, or at least very soon after the pupil returns home, the Supervisor of Indian Employment will correspond with the returned student for the purpose of getting more in personal touch with him and finding out something about his wishes, etc. His answer will be attached to and filed as part of this report.

2. Health, height, and weight of returned students are sometimes very important in placing them properly; height and weight could be approximated very satisfactorily, though from the pupil records now in use all information called for in part 1 of this blank can readily be obtained and be definite.

3. The State, agency, and tribe are important, and where the pupil is not attached to any agency this fact should be stated and the Superintendent should give all available information as to the home and local conditions surrounding the pupil.

4. Where the outgoing pupil has passed the civil-service examination for any position, this fact should always be noted, giving position for which examination was taken.

5. It should be remembered that the Supervisor of Indian Employment can but seldom have a personal acquaintance with the outgoing student, and that he must depend on the information furnished in this report for his basis of action in behalf of the pupil.

6. The degree of Indian blood should always be given, as this fact largely determines how much effort will be made on behalf of any particular returned student; qualifications being equal, or nearly so, the preference will be given to those having the greatest degree of Indian blood.

7. This report should be forwarded promptly to the Supervisor of Indian Employment, Denver, Colo.

8. Reports on students from reservation schools should be made only as to those who leave the schools at 18 years of age, or older, and who will probably not go away to school.

9. If part 1 of this report is made out by the principal of a reservation school, the reservation Superintendent should supply information called for in part 2 if the principal is not informed as to home surroundings and local conditions. Such information is essential to a proper understanding of the difficulties and needs of the pupil.

10. When part 1 is made out by a nonreservation Superintendent, this blank will be sent by the Supervisor of Indian Employment to the Superintendent of the reservation where the outgoing student belongs. He should fill out part 2 and return the blank as promptly as possible, for practically nothing can be done until the information called for in part 2 is supplied.

Information under the heading "Employed since return as follows," will be valuable only in cases where the pupil has been home for some time.



SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE. — Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.
