INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

In reply have to say that ^{Greensky} Peter asked to be allowed to spend the winter in the country so we found a good home for him and he is living in a town where he is attending school all day. Since it is a part of Carlisle's training for its boys and girls to spend at least one year in a home away from the school, Peter is doing no more than every other Carlisle boy and girl has done. He is getting this training while he is still young so that when he gets older he will then have that time to spend in the shops. We do not place boys so young as he at trades in the shops. Peter is attending public school with white children. This he will do for 100 consecutive days uninterrupted. We consider the training our boys and girls receive in country homes surrounded by good people is very valuable and for their best good. I hope you will trust to our good judgment in this matter.

May the 9th, again advising me that you are in need of
your son Peter's services at home during the summer months.

mean more or less inconvenience to make the change that is

taken into consideration with Peter's patron, and it is
likely that your wishes can be complied with. If all ar-
rangements can be completed Peter will join the party of
home-going students the second week of June, and you will
be notified at a definite date later when to expect him at
home.
