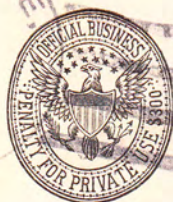
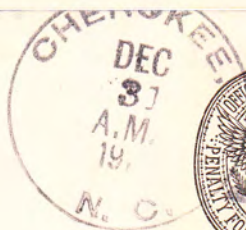

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

My dear Friend:

I have received your letter of the 7th instant to the effect that you desire to secure work in Harrisburg. In reply I must state that there are yet hundreds of men out of employment in Harrisburg and the nearby towns and that you would find it just as difficult to get along as when you became stranded last fall. I shall therefore not make any attempt to get work for you because it would be but a short time until you would again be without funds and without work and for the reason that I believe you are better off where you are.

Regarding the money belonging to you which you claim was spent by your step-mother you should see Superintendent Henderson. He can explain the matter to you and will see to it that your interests are protected.

Trusting that it will not be necessary for you to have another so unfortunate an experience as you had last fall to impress it upon you that you should stay out of this section of the country, I remain,

My dear Mr. Lipps:

Referring to your communication of the 9th, instant, I regret to say that Charley Long has only .43¢ to his credit at this agency. I am sending you check number 123 for this amount. His family is poor and unable to send him sufficient funds with which to pay his transportation. I agree with you that he is mentally incompetent. It was through my efforts at one time, that he was not sent to the Pennsylvania State Reformatory, and for this reason I opposed his transfer to Carlisle last fall.

I regret that I am unable to assist him in getting home. I believe if he could be sufficiently disciplined to make him go to some country home and work it would be better for him and for the Cherokees, should he be returned home.

If any way can be found to send him home I will do what I can to help him.

I advised the Doctor to put Charles on a car in order that I might have a talk with him here. Upon his arrival it was learned that he is out of work and without money and so I gave him the privilege to remain here until something could be done for him.

Instead of remaining at the school he has been running around town and when he came to sleep in the boiler house last night he was detained. I have ordered him locked up until I can hear from you what should be done with him. Are there any funds to his credit with you that could be used to
