

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

The cost of his transportation from Carlisle to Bayfield is \$22.55. An amount of \$2.00 in cash was advanced him to cover traveling expenses enroute and 36 cents had to be expended for an escort's transportation as far as Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

My dear Sir:

Simon Soulier, who was enrolled at Carlisle in 1912 for a four year period of enrolment, deserted from this school the second time on October the 6th, last. Ten days later he was returned to school only to desert again on October the 24th.

Very respectfully,

Because of such conduct and his associations with an undesirable class of people while he was a deserter it was decided best to send him away from Carlisle, as is indicated in the copy of a letter I transmit herewith.

Simon has to his credit in our school bank an amount of \$14.01, for which I enclose a check. I would thank you to secure his signature and endorsement on the check so that the amount can be applied toward payment of the total amount that had to be expended to send him home. It is also desired that you send me from Simon's account under your jurisdiction an additional \$15.30 to cover the balance of what had to be expended.

The cost of his transportation from Carlisle to Bayfield is \$26.85. An amount of \$2.00 in cash was advanced him to pay for incidental traveling expenses enroute and 96 cents had to be expended for an escort's transportation as far as Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

Regretting that such an unfavorable report has to be brought to your attention and hoping that you can co-operate with me to secure the amount necessary to pay the expenses I have enumerated, I am,

Dear Friend:

I have your letter of January 23rd, in which you inquire about your grandson, Simon Soulier. Simon ran away from the school about two weeks ago. We have been making every effort to locate him but so far have failed. We have heard that he is somewhere not far away and he has been seen several times, but he is practically white and does not look much like an Indian, and so far he has been able to go undetected. We have notified the police in town and are keeping a close watch out for him and, no doubt, we will locate him in a few days. Simon has not made a satisfactory record since he has been here, and we will probably return him to you as soon as we find him. We are not keeping at Carlisle boys who refuse to obey the rules of the school and take advantage of their opportunities. I can realize fully how you feel about the matter, and just as soon as we can locate him we will send him to you where you can look after him.

Referring further to your letter of January the 22nd and my reply thereto on the 26th instant, this is to advise that Simon Soulier was finally located in Carlisle the latter part of last week thru the assistance of the woman at whose house he was being harbored. He was locked up in our school guardhouse for safe keeping until arrangements could be made to send him away from school and on Saturday evening he was started for Bayfield. Transportation to Bayfield was procured for his use at his own request.

policemen, relative to the presence at home of Simon
Soulier from Carlisle school.

As my letter regarding the boy has reached
you by this time I shall only add that though it is re-
gretted very much that Simon had to be sent away from
Carlisle it seemed impossible to keep him in school and
absolutely inadvisable to keep him here because of his
actions and his indifference.

He is too bright a chap to be out of school, and if
the Superintendent of some other school is willing to give
him a trial after all the facts in the case are made known
I shall not object to his transfer.

Will you let me know how I can co-operate with you?



Dear Mr. Dady:

I have your letter of February 1st in reference to the desertion of Simon Soulier. I sent you a letter Thursday 6th, with which you returned to me Simon Soulier's check for \$14.01 signed and endorsed as was requested.

It has been noted that Simon does not have an account with you and that it would also be a hardship on his father to be required to pay for the transportation that was used by him. Under the circumstances it has been decided to pay for the transportation from government funds. In reference to Simon's account, Simon is a resident of Bayfield and has never had an individual Indian account with this agency, therefore it is impossible for me to forward a check for his traveling expenses, and it is hoped that the same can be paid out of transportation funds, as his father Mike has

to earn his living by working in the woods, and the wages this winter are exceedingly low, averaging \$15 to \$16 a month and board for work which three years ago was paid for at the rate of \$35 to \$40 a month and board.

An amount of \$2.00 was advanced Simon to pay for incidental expenses. That is being retained and check for the balance of \$12.01 is being enclosed herewith.



I have your letter of February 1st in reference to the desertion of Simon Soulier. I sent you a letter Thursday containing a report from our Indian policeman in reference to his arrival here not knowing that you had sent him home, as our policeman was under the impression that he had deserted.

In reference to Simon's account. Simon is a resident of Bayfield and has never had an individual Indian account with this agency, therefore it is impossible for me to forward a check for his traveling expenses, and it is hoped that the same can be paid out of transportation funds, as his father Mike has to earn his living by working in the woods, and the wages this winter are exceedingly low, averaging \$15 to \$16 a month and board for work which three years ago was paid for at the rate of \$35 to \$40 a month and board.




My dear Sir:
