SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.



This is to acknowledge receipt of your letter of November the 23rd, relative to the return home of Lillian Parkhurst and the sending of a representative to select additional students from among those who have applied to you for enrolment at Carlisle. In reply to your letter I must state that the expense of sending an escort with Lillian could not well be justified, and because the students who yet desire to come to Carlisle this year are just fourteen or a little older than that I believe older ones who have applied and will yet apply should be given the preference. Dear Mr. Hart:

I regret very much to report that our School Physician considers Lillian Parkhurst an undesirable student on account of the condition of her health and that he has recommended she be returned home with Miss Howard.

Before taking any action in the matter I would be pleased to hear from you whether the parents would consent to her transfer to the Sac and Fox Sanatorium at Toledo, Iowa, and whether they could provide the funds necessary to pay for her transportation to that point. Although they cannot be blamed for sending the girl to Carlisle I believe they should provide the transportation for her going to Toledo or to her home.

Below I submit a copy of the report that was handed to me this afternoon by our School Physician:

"I recommend that Lillian Parkhurst be returned to her home by the lady who conducted her. The girl, although not now actively tubercular, shows unmistakable evidences of the disease. I do not consider her a desirable student."

I see by reference to Lillian Parkhurst's weight chart that she has lost ten pounds in weight since entry. This lends support to my previous statement in regard to her condition and I can do no better than to recommend her dismissal.

Ea Jones should also be dismissed as being of strong tubercular tendency. Both girls will be able to travel alone.

I further recommend the dismissal of both Henry and Paul Tomau, Paul to be sent to a sanitarium if possible as he is actively tubercular.

Dear Sir:-

Referring to the matter of the return of Lillian Parkhurst, her father, Edward Parkhurst, was in my office to day, and says that she does not seem to be well and is anxious to return home, but he does not feel able to pay the expense and, further more, seems to think that the responsibility does not rest with him as she was passed by Dr. Powless as to be physically fit.

If Lillian is not doing well, I suggest that the matter be taken up with the Indian Office and authority be requested to pay her return fare, as she was sent through no fault of yours or of this office. I regret exceedingly that the mistake should have been made, but in these matters we are obliged to depend to some extent at least, upon the report of the physician who examines the child, which in this case, was favorable.

Please advise me what you think can be done in the matter.

Dear Sir:-

Referring to your letter of September 28th, I have just had an interview with Edward Parkhurst, father of Lillian Parkhurst, the girl that you recommend to be returned to Oneida, and he prefers that she return here rather than that she should be transferred to Toledo, but states that he is without funds to pay her transportation.

I regret that Lillian cannot be accepted, but of course I had no personal knowledge as to her physical condition and depended upon the examination of Dr. Powless who lives near her father and should have known if there were any adverse features in her family history. Dr. Powless is a Carlisle graduate and I had thought him capable of making the required examination and had sent the children to him, ~~and~~ being the most accessible as well as best acquainted with their history.

If there is any one going west with whom she could be sent, it will probably be best to return her to Wisconsin. I do not know what arrangement can be made about her fare, as her father appears to be unable and is certainly unwilling to pay her fare.

I may be able to see you within a month and will discuss the matter more fully with you.
