I am sending you X ray picture of Chas Tewinin's foot with the request that you return the photo so that I may file same with my records. At XI will be seen an old fracture which has healed in somewhat of a malposition. At X 2 is seen the nail bed left after the removal of an ingrown toe nail. In my opinion little is to be expected from an operation in this case, and I believe the boys foot will always remain weak. If Charles wishes to go to Philadelphia for further advise he should by all means do so.

Our school physician reports that Charles has an old injury produced by a horse stepping on his foot, which is giving him trouble. He has taken an X ray picture of this and is treating Charles now.

Charles is anxious to go home as he is discouraged and "tired" as he says and I am willing to allow him to go if you can provide the necessary transportation for his return. The fare from Carlisle to Rushville, if that is where you want to meet him, will be about \$36.00.

Dear Sir:-

I have your letter relative to the return to this school of Charles Twin. In reply I have to say that unless Charles has changed his attitude towards school and work, I would not want him to come back. He did very little work in either the academic or industrial department when he was here, his excuse being ^{his} inability to work on account of a lame knee. He was sent home because of this knee. If his knee is well now so that it will not interfere ^{with} his work and he can make up his mind to do more and better work than he did when he was here, I might accept him. I could not however pay his fare back to Carlisle. He must do that.

Mary Locke's application for enrollment here has been approved and you can send her at any time you wish. She was a good pupil and we would be glad to have her back. *She too will have to pay her fare back as we have about exhausted our transportation funds.* Very truly yours

My dear Mr. Lipps;-

Charles Twin, aged 17, has received a letter from the Indian Office, in reply to a request to be sent to some auto factory, that he should attend some non-reservation, preferably Carlisle, before he can be sent to the factory.

Charles was formerly a pupil of Carlisle and from what I can learn was returned to the reservation on account of sickness. He now wishes to return to Carlisle. Will you receive him and if so will you pay his transportation.

Mary Locke told me a few days ago that she still desired to return to Carlisle but that the ticket for her transportation had not been placed at Gordon to her order. You placed transportation some time ago at Rushville for pupils to Carlisle, but as it was some months ago I thought it perhaps wise to write again before furnishing her the ticket. Please let me know in regard to these pupils at your earliest convenience.
