I regret very much to advise you that it has become necessary to dismiss your son Elmo from Carlisle and that arrangements are being completed to have him leave here this evening for Pawnee.

Elmo has caused a great deal of trouble throughout the entire school year just past, and in spite of every reasonable punishment that could be given and all the personal effort I have put forth to keep him decent and in line with what is right he has again given us trouble and has forfeited all right to further consideration and leniency. On Sunday while under the influence of liquor he practically destroyed an instrument belonging to the School Band and if he has any funds to his credit with Superintendent Stanion I shall insist on having the Government reimbursed for the cost of the instrument.

It is especially deplorable that Elmo has gradually become so useless a character because of your interest in him and the splendid prospects he has had to become one of

instrument previously referred to was sent to the factory
to be repaired it was found that the harm done it was not
so great as outside appearances indicated and that a total
amount of \$10.50 would cover the cost of the repairs neces-
sary to put it into fairly good condition.

It seems only fair that such an amount should be with-
held from the next annuity payment to which Elmo is entitled.

I am beginning to feel a decided reluctance in the matter of sending any of our Pawnee boys and girls to Carlisle.

It appears from the records that Elmo has no funds to his credit and very little prospect of any accruing until the next annuity payment, at which time, however, I will endeavor to see that the Government is reimbursed for the horn destroyed by him if you write me the amount which you feel would be a proper settlement therefor.
