My dear Mr. Lipps:

We shall be glad to receive Mr.

George Pipe at any time you can arrange to have him come. If he should be able to come on the 18th, next Monday, he would have the benefit of 9 weeks of the present Winter term. The charge per week for any time less that a term, for students not preparing to teach in the public schools of Pennsylvania, is \$6.00, or \$54 for the remainder of this term. To this must be added the usual enrollment fee of \$5.00, which is paid once a year. The charge for the Spring term is \$72.25. This includes all necessary expenses except whatever is expended for books and stationery. I may say that we rent our books to students at a very small rental charge.

George Pipe would be able to take up Reading and Public Speaking, Grammar and Composition, Geography, United States History, Algebra. If he has not had Algebra, he could not advantageously begin it before the 30th of March, when new classes are organized. I shall be glad to adjust that matter, however.

In addition to the foregoing subjects, he could take Penmanship, Freehand Drawing, and Manual Training, but I presume he either has had these in your school or does not care to make use of them. To enroll he ought to bring with him the amount of tuition for the present term, which is \$5 plus the \$54, or \$59. Please let me know at what time he is expected to arrive here, so that I may be on hand to assist him in getting started.
