SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Dear Sir:

Enclosed I am sending you a copy of a letter which I sent this day to John Gokee Jr. a young student at your school. I am also sending you John's letter to me, which letter I would be glad to have you return at your convenience to be placed in my files.

I am very pleased to hear that John has a chance to go to Philadelphia, my old home town, to learn a trade, for I think it will be a good move for him. I am further pleased with the idea because if John returns to the Reservation I fear he will be inclined to fall back into the habits of the young boys with whom he went when he was here, and if he does, he will be inclined to take up drinking again on the sly, or even if he would be able to keep from this, there is little work for him to do here. He would be idle unless he would feel able to go into the woods and work as a lumber man. This district for a long time depended entirely on the lumber business for its support, this business is rapidly now decreasing and agriculture is coming in, but it costs so much to clear theland, from \$40 to

over \$100 an acre, and unless a man has funds there is little hope of him taking up farming. John has no funds and his land is not located near a road, so there is no hope of him farming, and I know he will make a better success in life if he could take up a trade in one of the larger cities, which I take from his letter you are assisting him to do.

Dear John:

After I received your letter I made inquiries regarding any lands which you may possess in this district or at Bad River. We had no records here of the old Business Committee decisions though they had at Bad River. You are an heir under the old business committee decisions to priions of two estates, one Jescoh Lamicum \$2, and the other Maggie Lamicum. It will be a long process to prepare these lands for sale, for first we must held a hearing to determine the heirs under the modern and later ruling, then the results of the findings must be forwarded to the Washington Office for approval. After the approval is returned a petition would have to be presented and signed by the heirs, this petition in turn would have to be presented to the Washington Office for approval. When the approval is returned, the land must be advertised for sixty days, and then I doubt if a bid would be received, for we have firty or more pieces for sale at present, and during the last year have only been able to sell six. However, in order to start the process I have posted notices for hearings to be held on March 4, 1915, in these two estates. After the hearings are held I will forward my report to the Washington Office for approyel. I am sending you notices of the two hearings, but it will not be necessary for you to come here, for the evidence which counts most is that given by disinterested persons. The heirs being unged to be present at the hearing to refute any statements which may be made by disinterested persons. If you wish to make an affidavit in the two cases, however, you can go before Mr. Idpps and make them, have them sworm to before him, and forward an original and duplicate copy of the affidavits to me. I am sending a copy of this letter to Mr. Lipps so he will understand the situation.

I was very glad to notice in a recent issue of the Carlisle Arrow that you had been promoted to Sergeant of the band, or at least I presume it was for you. for the notice read John Gokee. I am always interested in knowing what our boys are doing at Carlisle and other places. I do not believe you should spend any funds coming home for the settlement of your affairs.

for I am not aware of any other affairs that need settling, and this matter can be settled through this office without your presence.

I am glad to hear that you intend to take up a machine trade in Philadelphia. This is the policy I have been working under for three years in this district; that is, encouraging our young men who do not take to farming to go out into the towns and cities and learn a trade, knowing, by close contact with the good men in their trade, they will make rapid advances toward the goal of every young Indian man; that is, proper home life and high standards of citizenship.

## SUGGESTIONS FOR SUPPLYING THE INFORMATION REQUESTED ON THIS BLANK

1. The report of nonreservation school Superintendent should be made at the time or a little before the pupil leaves school, whether at the end of the school year or during the school year, provided the pupil is 18 years of age or over, or younger, if for any special reason the pupil is quitting school permanently. As soon as this report is received, or at least very soon after the pupil returns home, the Supervisor of Indian Employment will correspond with the returned student for the purpose of getting more in personal touch with him and finding out something about his wishes, etc. His answer will be attached to and filed as part of this report.

2. Health, height, and weight of returned students are sometimes very important in placing them properly; height and weight could be approximated very satisfactorily, though from the pupil records now in use all information called for in part 1 of this blank can readily be obtained and be

definite.

3. The State, agency, and tribe are important, and where the pupil is not attached to any agency this fact should be stated and the Superintendent should give all available information as to the home and local conditions surrounding the pupil.

4. Where the outgoing pupil has passed the civil-service examination for any position, this fact

should always be noted, giving position for which examination was taken.

5. It should be remembered that the Supervisor of Indian Employment can but seldom have a personal acquaintance with the outgoing student, and that he must depend on the information furnished in this report for his basis of action in behalf of the pupil.

6. The degree of Indian blood should always be given, as this fact largely determines how much effort will be made on behalf of any particular returned student; qualifications being equal, or nearly

so, the preference will be given to those having the greatest degree of Indian blood.

7. This report should be forwarded promptly to the Supervisor of Indian Employment, Indian

Office, Washington, D. C.

8. Reports on students from reservation schools should be made only as to those who leave the

schools at 18 years of age, or older, and who will probably not go away to school.

9. If part 1 of this report is made out by the principal of a reservation school, the reservation Superintendent should supply information called for in part 2 if the principal is not informed as to home surroundings and local conditions. Such information is essential to a proper understanding of the difficulties and needs of the pupil.

10. When part 1 is made out by a nonreservation Superintendent, this blank will be sent by the Supervisor of Indian Employment to the Superintendent of the reservation where the outgoing student belongs. He should fill out part 2 and return the blank as promptly as possible, for practically nothing can be done until the information called for in part 2 is supplied.

Information under the heading "Employed since return as follows," will be valuable only in

cases where the pupil has been home for some time.

Referring to your letter of May 27 in reference to the realizing of money on the land which John Gokee owns or is heir to, I wish to advise that as stated in my letter to John dated February 2, 1915, the only land which John has or will have is one-half of the allotment of Maggie Lemieux, deceased, and a portion of the allotment of Joseph Lemieux #2, deceased. his right to this has not been determined and may not be for some time, so that at present there is no hope of John realizing anything on his land. As advised in my letter to John, I posted a notice setting a date for the hearings to determine the heirs of Maggie Lemieux and Joseph Lemieux #2, but no one appeared at the hearings. A second notice for hearing was posted on May 27th, and fifteen days' notice given to the second hearing, and no one appeared on the date set for this hearing either. The Office recently issued a circular stating that these hearings should not be held excepting for some particular reason, and then a charge is made of \$15 for each hearing. The Office advises, however, that the examiner of inheritances will in due time report to hold hearings which have not yet held, and when these hearings are held,

the two estates in which John is interested will be presented for proper action. John will lose nothing by the delay, for even if the hearings were held and John designated as one of the accredited heirs in each of the estates, it is doubtful whether the property could be sold, for it is not particularly favorably situated, and we find it very difficult to dispose of the most favorably situated lands on the Reservation. This district is gradually growing, and it may be that in two or three years, lands will have a fair value, at which time, if John does not care to farm, I would be willing to recommend that he sell his property.

In view of the above situation I would recommend that John be urged to continue his course at Carlisle, and after he graduated that he be indentured with some firm in one of the larger cities, for there is nothing here for him to do.

Enclosed I am sending you a letter received from John Gokee. Will you kindly advise John that I could not consider him for the position of policeman. We have at present a satisfactory man and look for no immediate change. We have one or two other men whom we could call on before we would feel it proper to call on a young man like John. Also you may advise him that due to the earnest efforts of the people interested in the matter, Bayfield voted out the saloons at the last election and the district will go dry after the First of July. This will lighten the police duties considerably. Further, I do not think this is the kind of work John should follow. I would recommend that he be indentured to some large firm, or be put in a position to learn a trade somewhere and stay in the East where he will have better opportunities than if he returns to this town where he will have little to do but to work in the woods, for he has no cultivated land which he can use, and it will take from \$30 to \$100 an acre to put any such land, which he may secure by inheritance, in proper shape, and as he has no funds at his disposal, the pro-
