This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

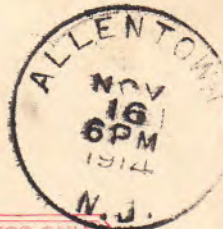

I have noted the definite information you so kindly conveyed to me in your favor of September the 11th, and I am now in a position to know better whether the young people who have applied to you for transfer to Carlisle should be accepted.

In regard to the request that has been made by the mother of the Raiche girls, I will state that I should like to co-operate with you to carry out her desires, but, under the law, transportation cannot be furnished for the younger girl until she has reached the age of fourteen.

The Cecelia Harto you have also recommended for enrolment here was a student at Carlisle from January the 12th to June the 3rd of 1913. It seems that shortly after her arrival here she complained to her grandfather, Mr. Antoine Denomie, that she did not get enough sugar for her coffee and not as much butter as she was accustomed to have at her home. Referring to your letter of the 3d instant concerning the transfer to Carlisle of four Odanah girls, the mother of the Raiche girls spoke to me today about the question of Margaret's ineligibility because of her age.

These two girls are exceptionally bright and clever Indians, and have finished a very satisfactory course in the Sisters' School at Odanah.

The mother is very anxious that they both go to Carlisle and she of course wants the younger girl to go with the older one, notwithstanding the fact that she is two months under age.

These people haven't any funds at their disposal with which to pay the younger girl's carfare to Carlisle and the mother was pretty anxious that I should write you and ascertain as to whether or not arrangements could not be made for both the girls to go and that transportation be placed at their disposal.

In view of their general character and worthiness, I would be glad to comply with the mother's wishes.

I have made inquiry also concerning the Newagon and Harto girls and can say that their records are very satisfactory

and that as far as I can ascertain they would make desirable pupils.

Sister Macaria Murphy I believe has given you their names as being eligible for transfer and in view of their record in the Catholic School at Odanah I can, without any hesitancy, recommend them as desirable pupils for Carlisle.

Will you not kindly advise me as to accepting the younger Raiche girl so I can let the mother know what she can expect in the matter?

I will report later upon the matter of the Starr and Bemessay boys who have also filed applications for admittance to your school.

I am not so sure about the desirability of the latter young man as his reputation in the past has been far from being above reproach.

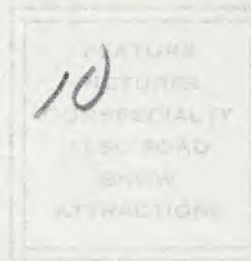
