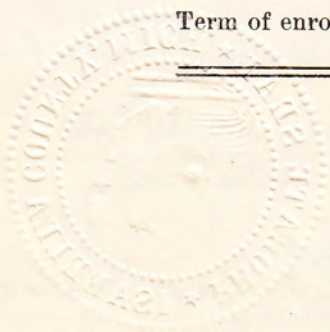

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

As you know your daughter, Catharine Peters has been living with Mrs. Charles Brosius, Chatham, Pennsylvania, under our outing system. I had a message last Friday evening from the Chester County Hospital asking authority to operate upon Catharine for appendicitis. As the case was urgent, I had not time to get into communication with you, and took it upon my self to authorize the operation. I had word Saturday evening that the operation was performed Saturday morning and that the girl's condition was good.

I telegraphed you Saturday morning at Mount Pleasant but was not able to reach you. I telegraphed you again this morning at Grand Rapids at the above address.

I enclose a copy of a letter which I received from Mrs. Brosius which gives you the case in detail. You will see that we have done all we could for your girl and I trust she will come out all right. I might add that we had another case at this hospital about a month ago. It was a very severe case but the little girl is now at the school

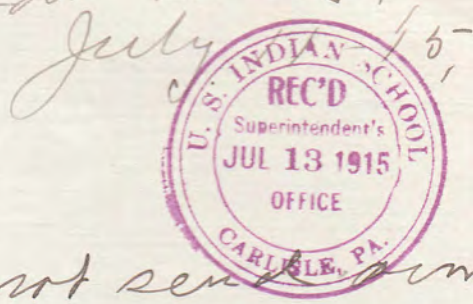

But suppose a student is of age and wishes to return home. Oh no, he must first finish his term (5 yrs) sort of sentence. You call it obligation on the student's part. But how about the obligations of Carlisle toward her patrons. Your statement makes it shaky, unconvincing.

It is not necessary that we give reason why she should come home at this time, enough to say that her time to return is due, and we expect to see her soon, and expect you to do your duty toward the patrons of our grand school. This is in reference to Kathryn Peters who is at present under the 'outing'.

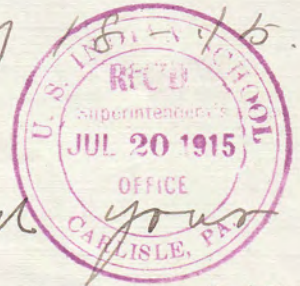

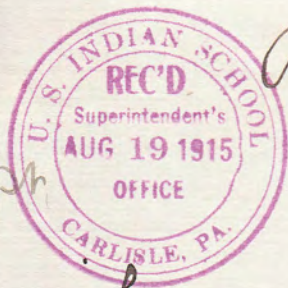
