INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

My dear Mr. Allen:-

I have your letter of the 20th inst relative to Marie (Mary) Flasis and have to say that she left here in April 1913 because of the serious illness of her sister, before she completed the course. We heard last year that she was at Wapeton but assuming that she had gone there because the climate was more agreeable to her health condition, we made no protest. If she has completed the course at the Wapeton School, she is eligible for enrollment at your school. If you are willing to keep her, I will offer no objection and will release her from this school.

In 1911 we had to send her sister home because of lung trouble. This sister died about a year ago. When Mary's return to the school, after a summer spent at her home, was in consideration, our physician here recommended as follows,-"This case had better remain on the reservation until the improvement is shown to be permanent." It was only after the Agency Physician recommended it, that we allowed her to return to Carlisle the fall of 1913. He had treated her for pulmonary tuberculosis of the lungs. My opinion is that Mary would better not come to Carlisle again.

We have had the same difficulty you have had in

having ineligible pupils sent to us. Arrangements are in progress now to return three Piegan girls and one Winnebago girl to Genoa, next week, tickets having been placed in Carlisle by Mr. Davis for the use of these girls. None of these girls had completed the course there and were therefore not eligible for enrolment here. About two weeks ago, I returned to the White Earth reservation, two boys who had enrolled here this fall and whom I found out afterwards, were deserters from the Pipestone School. These errors are due to the failure on the part of the reservation Superintendents to comply with the Office regulation that no pupil should be transferred from one non-reservation school to another until he had completed the course in the one. So far we are out several hundred dollars because these Superintendents have sent us ineligible pupils. There should be some action on the part of the Office to see that we are protected. Have you any suggestions to make as to the proper method of getting this matter before the Office?

This is to certify that Mary Fleet was under my care at the Agency Hospital from August 12th to September 1st 1913, and during that time was seriously ill.

The diagnosis of both myself and Dr. Sharkey of Pella, S. D. - a consultant in the case, was Ordinary Tuberculosis of the left lung. Owing to the fact that there is not a microscope on the reservation, the diagnosis was not confirmed by laboratory methods - The girl has rapidly improved, and her lungs at present are apparently normal, although she has a slight cough and accumulation of mucus in her throat in the morning.
