SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

My dear Sir:

Upon receipt of your Mr. Haygood's letter, addressed to Joseph Javine at this school, I had a talk with the young man at my office. I learned that he has given up the idea of running away from school and that he desires to complete his period of enrolment.

The money that has been received here from Joseph's people was in amounts as follows: December 22nd, \$10.00; March 18th, \$20.00 and February 27th, \$5.00. Other than that our records do not show what he has received.

In this connection I beg leave to state that Joseph wants an amount of about \$50.00 placed to his credit in our School Bank, so that he can then draw monthly allowances from the Bank to be expended under supervision. I recommend that his request be complied with.

My dear friend Joseph:

Referring to your letter of April 28, 1914,
and to my letter of May 2, 1914, to your father, of
which I sent you a copy, I am just in receipt of a
letter from your father, as follows:

"Tulsa, Okla., May 12, 1914.

Sir:

I received a letter from you in regard to
not sending the boy no money. That is not so,
for I have, \$5 is all he asked a month and at
different times I sent him \$5 and \$10 and once
I sent him \$20 and besides a box of clothes.
When you understand the situation you will
understand it better. The boy has written
to his sisters that he aims to run away from
school when he got a chance to. He wrote me
once that if I did not send him money to come
home on he would leave and I would never hear
tell of him again, so you see I have been very
careful about sending him too much for fear he
would leave. Hoping this is satisfactory,

From the above it appears that your fathers
intentions are to send you enough money to give you an


allowance of \$5 a month. Please send me a memorandum of the approximate dates on which you have received money, and the amount. If you find that an allowance such as you have been receiving is not sufficient for your needs, have Supervisor Lipps approve your request for an increased allowance and the matter will be taken up with your father.

It would, no doubt, be a good experience for you to have the Superintendent of Carlisle School detail you for a portion of the summer under the outing system. This would give you an opportunity to earn money for yourself and give you a better idea of its value than you otherwise would have.

If you have had any idea of leaving Carlisle without permission I trust that you have abandoned such intention and that you will not return here without first securing the necessary permission from those concerned.

My dear Mr. Lipps:

Referring to your letter of Oct. 18, 1915 wherein you state that you advanced Joseph Javine, an Osage Indian boy \$33.09 to defray his expenses from Carlisle and requested that the amount be reimbursed, you are informed that this matter was taken up with Mr. John Javine, the father of this young man, and he does not feel that he should be called upon to pay this expense. For your information, his letter is quoted below in full:--

"Received your letter in regard to me paying \$33.09 for Joes fare back home. I dont see that I am to blame for I sent him the money to come home after them notifying me he wanted to come. Why they did not send him then I dont know and I dont think I have a right to pay it. I know of other cases just like mine and they never paid. They should have sent him when I sent the money".

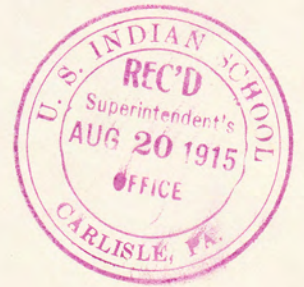
