SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

I received this letter from Mrs. Denny in answer to ~~mine~~ asking her if she could not find us a good girl answering Lena Watson's description.

When I wrote to Mrs. Denny I told her that I would come down to Barbours and see anyone she might choose but death in the family with its necessary influx of relatives makes it impossible at this time; so I am going to ask you if you will see that this young girl is started as soon as possible. She no doubt has a bank account and if she will get her own ticket we will make it right with her where she comes.

My dear Estaiene:--

I have been long in answering your letter but have been very busy getting ready to go away. We leave for Wisconsin and Dakota this morning to be gone until October 7th. We may take in the Conference at Lawrence if the baby stands the trip well, and it is not too warm.

I think I have The Girl for you. She is Lena Watson, a girl whose term at the school has expired but who is still here. She is unsettled as to what she wants to do. I think she wants to get out and earn money. She has worked for me in my home, when I was keeping house, so I feel free to recommend her in every way. You or the Baldwins would better come to Carlisle and see her and make the necessary arrangements for her going to you. Lena is a nice, refined good-looking girl. I should say she was about half white, perhaps more white than Indian. She comes from California, tribe Digger, age now 22 years. She has had a lot of outing experience and could do the work well. She is strong and healthy. You would just better come and see for yourself. She has the letter which you wrote me. In great haste, I am

My dear Mrs. Denny:

We have just had the misfortune to lose a maid (through sickness) who has been with us for more than four years, and I wondered if you might not have a real good, wide-awake, capable girl at Carlisle who does not care to go to school longer and who would thoroughly appreciate a good home.

Mrs. Baldwin has always kept two girls until this year, beside a man ^{and} myself, but her older girl, who was a high-school graduate, and who was with her for more than six years left last fall to enter a hospital for training. Since that time she has (at my suggestion) kept but one. The present maid ^{who} has been here for nearly five years, was stricken nearly a month ago with an acute attack of appendicitis and will not be able to work again for some time, so Mrs. Baldwin feels that she must get some one in her place.

One girl is really enough here, because Milton (the chauffeur) cleans the porches

and walks outside, beside doing a ^{amount} of things in the house. Then Mrs. Baldwin is a washer-woman and always has regular caterers come in when she has more than three or four people in to a meal.

This house is one of the best arranged and equipped I have ever seen, and Mr. and Mrs. Baldwin are of the kindest people in the world. I have been here nearly five years and I have the first time to hear either of them say an unkind word to the other one, or to the people in their employ. To bear out this fact I have only to tell you that, with only one exception in their long married, but one girl has been discharged, and that was for unpardonably uncleanly habits. Nearly all of their girls have been married from here. One, whom I know, worked here for twenty years and just idolizes both Mr. and Mrs. B. Another, whom I also know, and who was married from here, lived with them for ten years so you can see there is no question about their treatment of and consideration for their help. And from my personal experience I can assure you that there are no nicer people anywhere.

The maid here has a nice bedroom and large sitting-room at the front of the house on the third floor and a perfectly equipped, modern private bath. She is at perfect liberty to use the sewing-room at her will and pleasure when her work is done, and when we are away, whether that be three weeks or three months there will be nothing deducted from her wages.

You can understand the necessity, of course,

having ~~some~~ ~~one~~ who is honest and reliable
then everything is left unlocked in her charge
during our absence. It is a rule of this house
that nothing shall ever be locked up and that who
ever is employed, in whatever capacity, shall have
exactly the same food that Mr. and Mrs. Baldwin have.

Heretofore when we have gone away, with
only one maid in the house, Mrs. Baldwin has had
one of her ^{older} sisters stay with her at night, in event
of getting a girl from Carlisle we will have her
stay at night with our Chauffeur's wife who is also
alone except for a son of five and one-half years. She
is a thoroughly nice woman and will be glad for the
company.

Mrs. Baldwin, as you know, is no longer a
young woman and dreads this change of help, so if
you can possibly find a girl who will fit in here.
who will look after ^{their} interests as though they were
her own. who is bright and enthusiastic and good to
look at we will be eternally grateful.

The wage here is five dollars per week
although I have known Mrs. Baldwin to pay more.
She says she will start a girl on \$3.50 and increase
her wages 25 cents per month until she receives
the maximum wage. I know from having lived
here so long that what girl gets depends much
upon the interest she shows. For instance whenever
Mrs. Baldwin has company she never fails to give
one or two dollars extra because her work has been
increased. if she goes for a holiday they never
fail to pay rail-road fare etc. They are genuinely

I forgot to say that Mrs. Baldwin wished me to say that she per-
missible to have a girl who is more than a medium size and more
Indian. I will explain that she is a great admirer of the French.

thoroughly good to their help and genuinely find of them.

I have not made it known here that Justina is not coming back because I thought it would be such a nice home for one of our own girls. I say "I" because as time has gone on I have assumed charge of the house-keeping when I am here, to save Mrs. Baldwin. With them both what ever I say or do ^{is} exactly right.

If you think you have anyone who would like to come and live with us let me know and will run down to Carlisle and see her at any time.

I am looking forward to seeing you at Lawrence this year. I have been away so much that I am almost ashamed to go but both Mr. and Mrs. Baldwin think I ought to, so I suppose I will. My friends tell me they should think I would be ashamed to take my salary.

Do let me hear from you promptly, will you not, Mrs. Denny?

Trusting that you can put your hand on exactly the person we want and that she will "fill the bill", I am

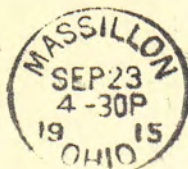

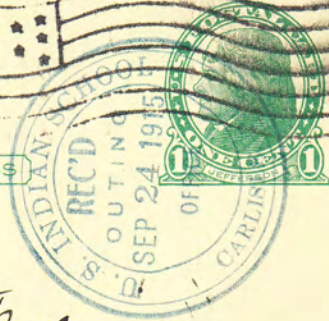

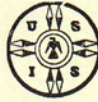
