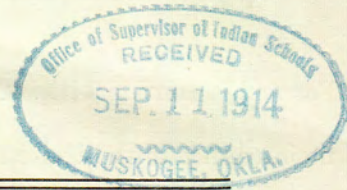

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

We have finally succeeded in learning from Timmie Taylor that he had the eighty dollar check you sent him cashed and that the money has been expended. He also states that he had the oil and gas mining lease you sent to him executed in Carlisle and that it was returned to you.

No one here has any knowledge about the lease or the methods Timmie used to get the check cashed, and he seems to be rather reticent about the transaction.

Please advise me what else can be done to aid you in the matter and let me know whose endorsements appear on the check besides Timmie's.

Dear Sir:

Herewith I submit you copy of a letter I have forwarded this day to Timmie Taylor, of Sapulpa, Okla., who is now one of your students.

You are doubtless familiar with the regulations of the Commission to the Five Civilized Tribes relating to the executing of oil and gas mining leases by restricted Indians. In the event that you are not, I will say that the departmental leases invariably are of the exact form which I have sent Mr. Taylor, and are subject to investigation always, before approval, by the commission officers at Muskogee. Consequently, it is customary for the fullbloods to lease at will, trusting to the Union Agency to prevent any fraud or error.

Adequacy of consideration is always determined by the department after the lease has been submitted for approval, and in case the amount of bonus is considered insufficient the lessee has the option either of meeting the department's figures or of surrendering the lease.

It is probable that Tim will ask your help in executing the lease. I shall appreciate your seeing that he has filled out all the witness blanks properly and has signed before your notary.

Dear Tim:

Mose Bailey told me today that you were
at Carlisle.

The company that had the lease on the south
eighty acres of your allotment, surrendered it for
cancellation when the rentals fell due about a month
ago. I don't know whether you got your notification
card or not. However, it is open now.

I am sending you leases already filled out
to cover the right land, together with my check for
\$80, being one dollar an acre bonus at this time. The
department may raise this, but that is what has been
paid recently in the Kelleyville country and seems to
be about right.

If you decide to lease again, sign all four
leases and acknowledge execution before a notary public
and have two witnesses sign. Then take the bonus affidavit
to the superintendent and explain it to him and ask him
to make your affidavit as a United States officer.

I am also enclosing a "notification card", which
the department wants mailed to Muskogee on the day the
lease is executed. Kindly see that it goes off the same
day in the big envelope enclosed.

I must inform you that Timmie Taylor deserted from this school on the 14th ultimo and that we have not succeeded in finding out where he is located.

Just two days before he deserted it was learned here that he had received an eighty dollar check from Mr. Billingslee in Tulsa as a bonus on the south eighty acres of his allotment for which a lease was to be executed. Timmie evidently had the check cashed and must have used some of the money to pay for a ticket.

Timmie Taylor, who is one of the Creek young men enrolled here, has come to this office with a letter which indicates that in October of 1914 he received an amount of \$100.00 as a partial payment to equalize his allotment in the Creek Nation. As the appraised value of his allotment was \$437.71 he desires to have the use of a part of the balance of \$262.29 that is yet due him.

It is recommended that favorable consideration be given Timmie's request if it is not more desirable to hold the money for other expenditures than for personal wants while he is in school at Carlisle.


There is enclosed herewith letter from Timmie Taylor, addressed to Mr. George M. McDaniel, former Field Clerk here, stating that he wished to return home for the summer so that he might look after some lease matters. It is very much desired that Timmie remain at Carlisle, and not return here for the summer. The influences here are not for his best interest and it is probable we would have trouble in getting him to return.

With respect to leasing his allotment, desire to state his land is already covered with an oil and gas mining lease, and is rented for agricultural purposes for the year 1915. However, it is not necessary for him to return here to make a new agricultural lease for the coming year, as this can be done by this office for him, and the papers forwarded to you for his signature. It has been our experience in agricultural lease matters where allottees have us assist them, we usually secure double the consideration they usually get and sometimes

more. I will have our Government Farmer inspect Timmie's land for the purpose of making a new lease contract. We have many inquiries here from responsible farmers who want agricultural leases, and we can, in this way, secure some one who will not only pay an adequate consideration for his land, but at the same time, place improvements upon it.

I also return the blank application for leave which accompanied his letter, as I am unable to give any reasonable grounds for his return.



Dear Mr. Lipps:

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of September 28, 1915, also of a letter signed by J. W. Huff, Acting Superintendent, under date of October 13, 1915.

Replying thereto you are respectfully advised that equalization funds due allottees, under the policy of the Department, should be used in making improvements upon allottee's land so that he have something of permanent value out of moneys paid him in lieu of land. However, in case of a minor in school, if he is in need of funds for current expenses, he may be paid as much as \$25.00 in any one month, the entire amount paid him in any school year not to exceed \$100.00. In the cases of Timmie Taylor, Creek Roll No. 7308, and Alex Simmer, Creek roll No. 3215, if these allottees need small amounts to assist them during their school life, it may be paid as above stated.

In order that the matter of such payments, if desired, may be based upon requests for specific payments of amounts desired this office will appreciate a further communication from you embodying such recommendations.

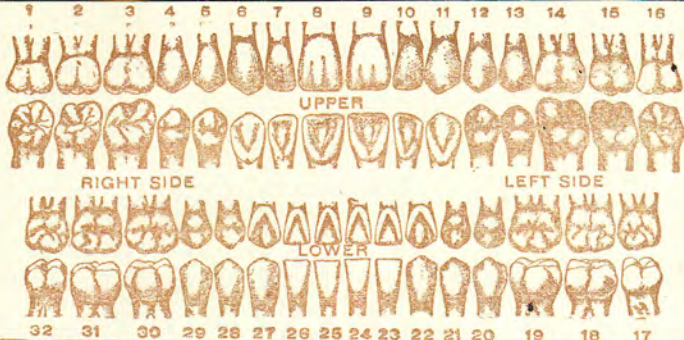
