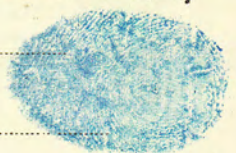

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

My dear Sir:

Agnes Waupano, who has been enrolled here from the Keshona Agency since 1910, has caused so much trouble and has required so much extra care which should have been given to more worthy girls that it has finally been decided she cannot be kept here any longer.

She informed me that she attended a Catholic School before she came to Carlisle, and if you can be assured that she will again be admitted to such a school, where she will be controlled and restrained, I shall not object to her leaving this school for that purpose. However, if she cannot be placed in such a school, I shall have to take steps to have her committed to some reform institution here in the east. It is my opinion that she should not be allowed to return to her home unless it can be arranged in some way that she will be closely guarded and protected.

I would thank you to let me hear from you without delay regarding this matter, so that I can co-operate with you fur-

ther in doing what is decided best for Agnes. At the present time she is really a very bad influence here and she should not be allowed to associate with the other girls here longer than is absolutely necessary.

Referring to your letter of July the 28th, this is to report that Agnes Waupano was taken to the House of Good Shepherd, Reading, Pennsylvania, on Friday, July the 31st, where she was turned over to the Catholic Sisters in charge of that institution.

In view of the fact that contributions are accepted for the maintenance of the home where the girl was taken it is my opinion that Agnes should pay a reasonable amount for her care while she is absent from Carlisle. Will you co-operate with me in the matter by reporting what resources she has and whether any of her funds could be used for such a purpose?

Her name will be continued on our school rolls, so that I will be in a position at all times while she remains in the east to take whatever steps are necessary to assist with the care of the girl.

I often think of Carhile school and many a day I wish I were back there or to some country home I often think of my country mothers how they tried to help me along I am thankful today for what they did for me I often wish I had enough money to go back to Pennsylvania and

work for some white people
out there, if I was only back
to one of my country mothers
I took them a own mother
since I have no mother I feel
I'm alone in this world. I
have a father but Mr. Lipps
I'm sorry to say my father
dose not seem to care for me
and yet I'm his only daughter
how I wish my mother was
living to tell me what to do
but I have tried my very best
to keep on the right road
only once I almost got myself
in trouble when I was with
two girls I should have not
went. with I'm sorry to say
one is a carlice girl, and
so many girls are going to
ruin ~~ruin~~ around here

and for that reason I often wish I were under the outgoing system under the rules since I have no mother to tell me what to do I am most willing to be under the rules of a Country mother.

I am expecting to make out my application for my \$90. in May as I will be 21 years of age. I been wanting to get work and it is so hard to get work around here, in a way I'm sorry I ever came home just by seeing how things are going on how much better if I was out there and if I had the money I'd go today and work for my own living I'm not afraid ~~of~~ of work.

Dear Mr. Lipps:-

Sister M. St. Andrew Corsini gave me the following report of Agnes Waupano who was taken to the House of Good Shepherd, Reading, Pa., July 31, 1914. I visited Agnes on May 7, 1915.

Agnes' conduct has not been considered good since she entered the institution. She repeatedly seeks the lower class of girls as companions against the advice of those in authority. She receives numerous letters from boys in Panama. Agnes says she does not know these boys, therefore I judge her name has been given to them by Harold Bishop, a former Carlisle student whose character is extremely low. These letters are not fit to be given to Agnes, hence she is not allowed to read them.

Agnes had a bad cold while I was there and could scarcely speak above a whisper. She wants some operation on her throat. Sister thinks an operation unnecessary as the physician in charge would know if such were needed. Agnes does not attend day school, she did not care to but is obliged to attend the evening school- regular academic work. She took up music for a time but soon tired of it.

Sister says that Agnes cannot be trusted. She seems to be always planning to "get out". She would run away at the first opportunity but says she does not want to return to her own home. From characteristics exhibited by Agnes, Sister believes that were she to leave the institution now she would land in a disreputable house in Reading or in some other city. Therefore, she cannot recommend yet that Agnes be permitted to leave the institution. However, the Sister suggests that when Agnes does prove by her conduct that she can be trusted that we give her a trial in some good country home but not until this is recommended by the sister.

"Referring to your letter of July the 28th, this is to report that Agnes Waubano was taken to the House of Good Shepherd, Reading, Pennsylvania, on Friday, July the 31st, where she was turned over to the Catholic Sisters in charge of that institution.

In view of the fact that contributions are accepted for the maintenance of the home where the girl was taken it is my opinion that Agnes should pay a reasonable amount for her care while she is absent from Carlisle. Will you cooperate with me in the matter by reporting what resources she has and whether any of her funds could be used for such a purpose?

Her name will be continued on our school rolls, so that I will be in a position at all times while she remains in the east to take whatever steps are necessary to assist with the care of the girl."



She seems to have learned her lesson and was penitent and desirous of being given another trial. I thought it best however to send her home for the time being.

If her home conditions are such that the girl is liable to fall, I would favor giving her another trial by placing her in one of our outing homes. I wish you would have a talk with Agnes, and if you feel that it is for the best interests of the girl to let her return, let me know and I will make an effort to find her a home under the outing.

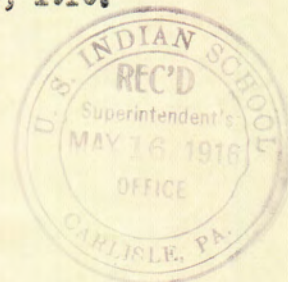
