My dear Sir:

A further inquiry has been made in regard to the matter you referred to in your favor of February the 15th, and I regret to advise that Roy's needs were grossly misrepresented to you. At no time has he been in need of anything that is provided for the use of all our boys here by the Government. What he has desired over and above that could, of course, not be provided.

For your further information I submit below a copy of a statement that was handed to me this morning by the Disciplinarian who is in charge of the Quarters where Roy is located:

"I respectfully submit the following in reply to your request for information regarding Roy Burton and the matter reported by him to his father. Roy is not sick nor is he in immediate need for more clothes. He has two good citizen suits besides the uniforms fur-

nished by the school. Shoes, underclothing and the like are furnished here to the boys and all have a goodly supply. His parents have no need to worry as to his health or supplies. Roy dresses well and I should say that his clothes are above the average.

I can see no reason for Roy writing for such large sums of money to his people unless it is to carry out some runaway plan that other boys may be making and they may want Roy to put up the money for the undertaking.

I would add that as disciplinarian I have nothing but a good report for Roy. I have always found him to be a boy of gentlemanly habits and good behavior."

I will also take this opportunity to commend you for sending money for Roy's use direct to me where it can be placed to his credit in our school bank and where the expenditure can be properly supervised. If at any time he is in need of funds I will be only too glad to approve any reasonable requests he may make, but for his own good it will be best not to send any money to him direct.

I have received your letter of the 20th instant and I am glad to have so frank a request from you relative to your grandson, Roy B. Burton. In reply to your letter I must state that Roy has gone to an outing home and that otherwise I should have had a personal talk with him before writing you. He can be reached direct at the home of Mr. Chester E. Roseboro at New Holland, Pennsylvania.

Roy has not applied himself as well as we should have liked to see him do this school year. He does not seem to see the importance of work and there is not the earnestness of purpose that a young man of his age should manifest who is anxious to make a success of his school days in preparation for the place he will have to take in the affairs of life when his school days are over. He has conducted himself quite properly during the year and has not been in any serious trouble of any kind.

Roy was instructed in our blacksmith shop during the

year, and as he is to work at the same trade at the outing home to which he had gone it is hoped we can report to you during the summer that he is making a better effort than here to do satisfactory work.

My dear Sir:

I have just succeeded in getting a full report of the record your son Roy made during the time he was absent from this school last summer under our Outing System and I regret to add that it is not a very favorable one.

He was at the home of Mr. Burtis from April the 9th to June the 1st. He then ran away from that home and loafed around until the 9th of June. He was caught then and sent to the home of a Mr. Smith for another trial. He was at Mr. Smith's home less than one month when he again became indolent and impudent, and on July the 7th he was returned to school here, where he has been ever since.

Roy was seen at the office here and questioned about the amount of money he claimed to owe for board and washing. He yet claims to owe that amount but has stated that he will pay the debt from the amount he

will draw from our school bank this month. It is my opinion that Roy deceived you about his debts, for he was provided with all that he needed while at the two homes referred to on the preceding page.

I will also add that whenever he is need of anything at all that is not provided by the Government I will take the liberty to get into touch with you at once and will let his wants be known.

Roy has done very well since his return to school, and if you desire that he shall have funds for incidental expenses from time to time it will be best to continue sending the same to him thru me. The several amounts will then be placed in bank to his credit and he will have the opportunity to draw monthly the same as all other students.

Hoping that your son's reports for this school year will be favorable, I remain,


