SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Sir:

Answering your letter of Sept. 5, with reference to your money I will say that your father had your share of the \$32.00 payment of Sept. 5, 1912 deposited to your credit in the American National Bank, Asheville, N. C. I can not send you any of your funds without first obtaining authority to do so from the Commissioner of Indian Affairs and since you did not tell me what you wanted to use your money for I can not make application to have same transferred to your credit at Carlisle, unless you have your Superintendent recommend the same.

You have \$79.28 in the American National Bank on interest at 5 per cent and unless it is absolutely necessary for you to have the money I would suggest that you allow the same to remain in the bank. I presume that you have had the opportunity to earn some money under the Outing System this summer.



(Nick Bradley) asked this morning to be permitted to take nothing but trades instruction. Says he is due to go home January. If this is really true that he is going home in January, we might make this arrangement for him. In the same breath, however, he stated that if he is permitted to drop academic work now, he would probably remain until the home party goes next May or June. He is now in Grade VII and is 20 years old, he says. ~~He hasn't~~ His attainments in academic work are not startlingly high for his age. It might be a good plan to consult his parents and his agent before granting such permission as he asks. On the other hand, Nick says he wants to get a job as a plumber after he leaves Carlisle; that he tried to get himself placed upon the plumbing detail some time ago but was unable to work it until recently. There are two sides to the question, and IF HE REALLY IS GOING TO LEAVE CARLISLE IN THE NEAR FUTURE, I do not care to make any recommendation but shall be satisfied with any action you may take.

My dear Mr. Lipps:

Referring to your letter of February 10, to Nick Bradley, copy of which you forwarded to me, I have to advise that Nick and his father have been to see me a number of times relative to his going back to Carlisle. The father is alone and is an old man. Nick seems to think that he should remain and help him with the farm work. For this reason he has decided not to return to Carlisle and is asking that the money to his credit be forwarded to him for use in buying some stock and farming implements.

I feel that the boy is in earnest and that if he has the funds to his credit it would be wise to send them to him as early as possible so that he can buy the necessary tools with which to begin his farming. I would suggest that you make it a direct payment rather than a transfer so that there will be no delay in his getting the money. Should it be made a transfer I would then have to ask Washington for authority to make the payment.
