SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

My dear Sir:

This is to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 10th instant, with which you enclosed a Money Order in the amount of sixty dollars to pay for the cost of the ticket you desire to have secured for the use of your daughter Gladys when the return home of her sister Clara has to be effected. The amount has been properly credited and will be used as you request.

Our physician reported this morning that Clara is in good condition to travel, but has a slightly higher than normal temperature each day. However, being accompanied by her sister she should be able to make the trip home without any difficulty.

As Superintendent Norris has approved your request to have Gladys at home too it is being arranged so that both girls can leave here on Tuesday evening of next week. That will give them the time they need to get ready for the trip and will enable us to arrange for the girls' care while they

Dear Mr. Lipps:

One of your former pupils, Gladys Snyder, has just been in the office, requesting permission to enroll this year at Genoa, instead of Carlisle. It seems that she has been at Carlisle for about two years, having returned here with her sister who was sick along about February.

There are several children from this reservation at Genoa, and she feels that it is so much nearer that she would prefer to go with the party from here. Furthermore, her parents feel that the climate at Genoa, being very much like the climate here, might agree with her better and she would be less liable to loss of health, in which I am disposed to agree.

I appreciate, as I am sure you will, the attitude of the parents in coming in and requesting your approval of this change before taking any steps in the matter.

We will appreciate a prompt reply, as a party will leave here for Genoa early in September.
