SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

AR INDIAN BOY DESERTER FROM CARLISLE SCHOOL

Story of Stancel Jumper, 13-Year-Old Cherokee, Disproved by Telegram.

Telegrams from the Cherokee Indian School on the Qualla reservation in North Carolina and from the Carlisle Indian School in Pennsylvania received today by Charles F. Hauke, second assistant commissioner of Indian affairs, convinced him that Stancel Jumper, the thirteen-year-old Indian boy found crying on the street yesterday, is a deserter from the latter institution.

Deputy United States Marshal Harwood Read, who found the boy crying in front of the Police Court yesterday morning, kept the boy in his office all day yesterday, and several officials of the Indian office interviewed him there in the afternoon. Last night he was sent to the house of detention, where he stayed until this morning.

School Agent Expected.

He was brought back to Mr. Read's office in the Police Court, where he was kept until F. L. Sharp of the Indian office, who has had charge of the investigation concerning the boy, came to the office and took him to the Indian office.

Mr. Hauke said this morning that an agent of the Carlisle school will arrive in Washington this afternoon and take the boy back with him to the government institution of learning. Telegrams from the Cherokee school convinced Mr. Hauke that Jumper is a Cherokee Indian, and came originally from the Qualla reservation, but he believed that his story of running away from there two weeks ago is absurd, as the Carlisle authorities telegraphed today that Jumper is a deserter from that school, having left there October 4, just two weeks ago today.

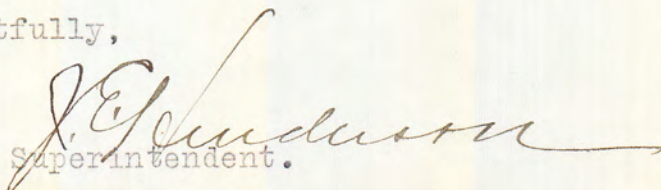

My dear Mr. Lipps:

Referring to your letter of February 23rd, relative to Stansill Jumper's condition physically, I would advise that if his condition is not precarious and if it is thought that he will live for several weeks I would suggest that you keep him at Carlisle until the weather is warmer. His father's home is in bad repair and Stansil would be very much exposed if he were to come home. We will have our hospital finished within a few weeks and he could then be brought to Cherokee and kept here.

You have been rather unfortunate with the Cherokees recently and for the influence it will have upon prospective students I would suggest that you send the sick ones home when they are able to travel. I will be glad to cooperate with you any way possible in taking care of those returning.

My dear Mr. Lipps:

This is to acknowledge receipt of your letter of November 16, with reference to Stancill Jumper now enrolled from this reservation in your school.

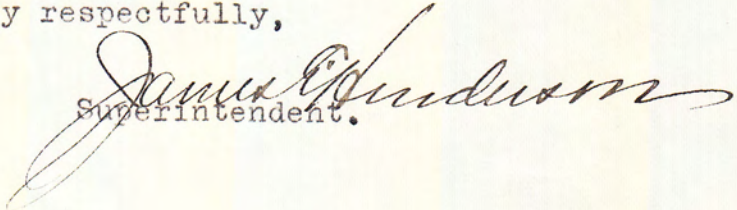
The father of Stancill is a good man, but is in very poor health at this time and is unable to do any work. The mother is industrious and she and a boy a year younger than Stancill are keeping the home together. If I knew that Stansill would help them rather than loaf over the reservation I would suggest that you allow him to return home. Should he return home I could require them to place the brother in school at Cherokee.

Referring to Stansill's reputation, I will say that I am somewhat surprised to know that he is not making good. My recollection of him is that he was a bright boy but one of those with whom it took tact to bring out his good qualities. If there is a chance to do anything for the boy, I would suggest that he be kept

at Carlisle, for should he return to Cherokee and be inclined to give trouble, his father would be powerless.

If after receiving this letter you decide that it is best to return the boy to his parents, I will do all I can to help him make good.

Superintendent.
