Mr. Lipps:-

Mr. Mann, teacher in charge of Room 12, reports the following:-

This afternoon, while "chapel" exercises were going on, James Crane, a member of Mr. Mann's group of students, was disorderly at times. As soon as the students belonging in Room 12 had returned to their room from chapel, Mr. Mann in the presence of the class reproved Crane for his disorderly conduct and stated that he (Mann) thought Crane ought to apologize to the rest of the class for what he had done. Crane then and there said he would not apologize, he didn't give a damn, he didn't care. Then Mr. Mann told him to leave the room. He left the room cursing and saying to Mr. Mann "You go to hell, you can't put me out, I dare you to come outside, I don't want any back talk from you, etc." Mr. Mann told him to meet him at the office of the Principal. Crane has not showed up.

I am not inclined to pass over lightly anything of this sort, much less from James Crane, whom I know to be lacking in the qualities that go to make up a gentleman.

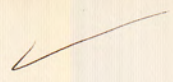

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Dear Sir:

I am returning herewith pledges regarding the use of tobacco signed by James Crane and Thomas Sheldon. These boys will leave here Wednesday for Mount Hermon, and I will ask you to kindly give them a little special attention until they get started. James Crane is a full blood Umatilla Indian, and Thomas Sheldon is a half blood Nez Perce. They may be a little timid at first, but I believe they will prove desirable students.

Relative to their tuition and board, I am requesting authority from the Indian office to approve checks drawn against their bank accounts here for a sum sufficient to pay their expenses. I am giving each boy \$25.00 for traveling and incidental expenses and the money for their board and tuition will be forwarded to them in your care as soon as the necessary authority is received from the Washington office. I should be pleased to have you advise me from time to time as to their conduct and progress.

I must also state that several weeks ago James was detected, for the first time as near as I can determine during all the time he has been a student here, having taken a drink of liquor with other young men here. He was told this morning that such information would have to be conveyed to you so that you could have complete details regarding his conduct before you for consideration.

My dear Sir:

I return to you herewith the letter from Mr. Cornelison which was transmitted to me with your favor of the 18th instant for my information relative to James Crane. Replying as was requested I must state that a year ago James was given permission to go to the Mount Hermon School at Mount Hermon, Massachusetts, but after an enrolment of but a week or two he elected to return here with another young man from this school who was not desirable for enrolment at Mount Hermon because of habits not allowed there. This year it was again James's desire to enter that school, but several weeks ago he was detected having drunk liquor and when the information was conveyed to the Principal of the Mount Hermon School with his application for re-enrolment he was refused entrance.

James was captain of a Troop here and had to be reduced to ranks for not aiding in the stamping out of the

drinking referred to, although as near as it can be determined he has not indulged in strong drink habitually while at Carlisle.

James has an ungovernable temper, but is a likeable young man in many ways and has given but very little trouble except when impudent because of his lack of self control.

In view of the fact that he is not in as good standing just at this time as he has been heretofore I would not be justified in recommending him for entrance at a school where special attention is given to religious work, but James knows I am personally interested in his welfare and that I will gladly assist him in any way possible just as soon as he demonstrates to me that he is in earnest. For the present, therefore, his request for funds need not be given consideration.

I have also requested him to apply to you for the help he will need to arrange so that after the fall work is completed he can go to the State School at Pullman to take the course in agriculture. He has promised me that he will do as I have requested and as he is not doing any good for himself here I believe it may awaken James to the realization that he must make an effort at once to demon-

strate that he desires to do something worth while. He is not a bad fellow by any means, has many likeable qualities, is popular among students and officials here in spite of his indifference and displays at times of an uncontrollable temper, and should turn out to be a creditable citizen. 

PART 1
REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF INDIAN EMPLOYMENT

SUGGESTIONS FOR SUPPLYING THE INFORMATION REQUESTED ON THIS BLANK

1. The report of nonreservation school Superintendent should be made at the time or a little before the pupil leaves school, whether at the end of the school year or during the school year, provided the pupil is 18 years of age or over, or younger, if for any special reason the pupil is quitting school permanently. As soon as this report is received, or at least very soon after the pupil returns home, the Supervisor of Indian Employment will correspond with the returned student for the purpose of getting more in personal touch with him and finding out something about his wishes, etc. His answer will be attached to and filed as part of this report.

2. Health, height, and weight of returned students are sometimes very important in placing them properly; height and weight could be approximated very satisfactorily, though from the pupil records now in use all information called for in part 1 of this blank can readily be obtained and be definite.

3. The State, agency, and tribe are important, and where the pupil is not attached to any agency this fact should be stated and the Superintendent should give all available information as to the home and local conditions surrounding the pupil.

4. Where the outgoing pupil has passed the civil-service examination for any position, this fact should always be noted, giving position for which examination was taken.

5. It should be remembered that the Supervisor of Indian Employment can but seldom have a personal acquaintance with the outgoing student, and that he must depend on the information furnished in this report for his basis of action in behalf of the pupil.

6. The degree of Indian blood should always be given, as this fact largely determines how much effort will be made on behalf of any particular returned student; qualifications being equal, or nearly so, the preference will be given to those having the greatest degree of Indian blood.

7. This report should be forwarded promptly to the Supervisor of Indian Employment, Denver, Colo.

8. Reports on students from reservation schools should be made only as to those who leave the schools at 18 years of age, or older, and who will probably not go away to school.

9. If part 1 of this report is made out by the principal of a reservation school, the reservation Superintendent should supply information called for in part 2 if the principal is not informed as to home surroundings and local conditions. Such information is essential to a proper understanding of the difficulties and needs of the pupil.

10. When part 1 is made out by a nonreservation Superintendent, this blank will be sent by the Supervisor of Indian Employment to the Superintendent of the reservation where the outgoing student belongs. He should fill out part 2 and return the blank as promptly as possible, for practically nothing can be done until the information called for in part 2 is supplied.

Information under the heading "Employed since return as follows," will be valuable only in cases where the pupil has been home for some time.

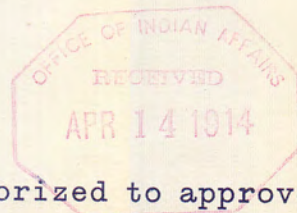
