SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.



## INDORSEMENTS.

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The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

*Provided*, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Upon receipt of your letter of July the 21st I directed our school physicians to make me a report regarding the condition of your son's health. I submit below a copy of the statement that was issued today by Dr. Frazer, our resident physician:

"Chas. Brokenleg was operated on for appendicitis at the German Hospital, Philadelphia, on June 26th. Eight days from the day of operation he was sent to Carlisle and while on the trip was overcome with the heat at Columbia and taken to the Columbia Hospital until the next day when he was removed here. Since he has been here he has improved in weight and strength, although he has not yet regained his normal weight.

I believe that a trip home would improve his health and therefore recommend that he go home until his health is regained."

In view of the fact that Charles's condition has shown steady improvement I would not be justified in sending him home at government expense. However, if you can provide funds with which to pay for his trans-

portation home and with transportation can be placed for his return to school at the termination of his period of leave it will be arranged to let him have a vacation during the month of August. An amount of seventy dollars will cover the entire expenditure for transportation and it will leave him a small sum to pay for incidental traveling expenses enroute home.


