My dear Sir:

On Saturday afternoon of last week Henry McKay who is enrolled here from Minnewaukan, went to Harrisburg and procured two quarts of whiskey with which he and other fellows like him got on a general drunk. He is now in our guard house and it has not been definitely decided whether it would not be advisable to turn him over to the Federal authorities to be dealt with as he deserves for bringing liquor here. It was not his first offense.

As the least we can do is to expel him from school I desire to be advised whether he has any funds to his credit that could be used to provide a ticket for his use to come home. It is my opinion that the government should not be required to incur any more expense in his behalf except to prosecute him for his crime.

Dear Sir:

I am in receipt of a letter dated January 28, 1916, from J. DeHuff, Acting Superintendent, relative to the conduct of Henry McKay, who is enrolled there from Minnewaukan, and who went to Harrisburg and procured two quarts of whiskey with which he and other fellows like him got on a general drunk. You state that it has not been definitely decided whether it would be advisable to turn him over to the Federal authorities to be dealt with as he deserves for bringing liquor there, as it is not his first offense; that the least you could do would be to expel him from school and you ask whether or not he has any funds here to his credit, with which he could pay his expenses in returning home.

In this connection I will say that I would recommend that you turn him over to the Federal authorities to be dealt with as, undoubtedly, his return here is just what he wants. It probably only would result in me having to take this procedure after he has committed this or some other crime here. Consequently, I believe that the sooner/^{he is} punished the better it will be for him.

He has no funds to his credit under my jurisdiction.

And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.
