SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.



Dear Sir:-

I have a letter from Mildred Sheridan, an Omaha child, of whom I am guardian, saying that she and her two sisters wish to come home during vacation. These girls have no good home; their mother is dead; their father is an incompetent drunkard, and the girls are not able to take care of themselves, and I am afraid that their morals will not be very safe if they are on the Reservation. They are not bad girls, but they have never had any training, and there is no one to look after them now. Do you not think that it would be advisable for them to remain under your charge? Let me hear from you.

My Dear Mr. Friedman:-

IN RE SHERIDAN GIRLS

I am enclosing you the letter of three homesick girls at your school. I am their legal guardian and I wish to give you some information in reference to these girls. Their mother died about four years ago. They had never been under very much restraint or discipline. Neither of their parents were up to the average Indians of their generation in intelligence. The girls have had no training, and since their mother died they have been woefully neglected. I have been working for almost a year to get these girls in school and there has always been some obstacle in the way. Their father is stubborn, and does not understand affairs very well. Besides he is a confirmed drunkard. I wish a very strict guard kept over the girls so that they will not get away, nor I do not want them to come home during the year, nor at vacation time. Owing to the fact that they have not been subject to restraint ~~an~~ discipline, and from my knowledge of them, I would suggest that they be given as much as possible, in personal attention and encouragement. You will find the girls are very reticent and hard to reach. They have spent a great deal of money on childish whims. I am quite sure the girls are all virtuous, although I feared for them the last few months they were



Dear Sir:

I am writing to you this morning to tell you that we don't like the school at all. So we want you to send for us to come home. It is very hard for us to get along so we decide to come home if possible, and also we want some spending money.

If you can, send the car fares to Mr. Friedman and tell him to send us home as soon as he can we don't want to stay here any longer.

We never got enough to eat since we came and we haven't any rooms like the other girls. We want to come back to Genoa. The Matron didn't treat us right as she should for this is our first Government school. We wish that you would give kindly attention to our request for we don't like it here and we want to come home as soon as possible. Rachel left here some time yesterday and we are very lonesome, and we getting home sick.

They haven't given us any kind of clean clothes to ware, so our clothes are very dirty and we haven't enough bed clothing at nights hither. We are feeling bad every day, we are sorry that we came here. We want to buy some clothing for ourselves so send the money as soon as you can and send the carfare to Mr. Friedman and send us some spending money besides the car fare. I don't know but I think it will take over hundred dollars for three of us. We wish to come home this week. Write to us as soon as possible.


Dear Sir:-



My dear Mr. Lipps:

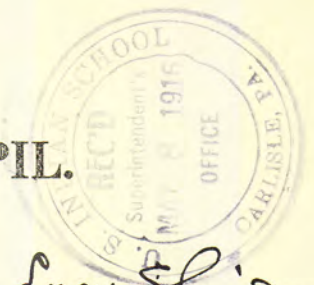

VACATION REQUEST FOR PUPIL.

We, the undersigned, respectfully request that leave of absence be granted Lucy Sheridan
on account of illness ^{and} Rose Sheridan to accompany
 her home
 from Date ----- to August 30 - 1916 to
 enable them to visit their home. We hereby agree to pay all expenses, including
 round-trip railroad fares, sleeping-car fares, meals, lodging, stage fares, telegraph and telephone messages,
 and other incidental expenses connected with the visit. We further agree that said pupil shall be
 returned to the ----- school on or before the last day of the leave of absence.
 We further agree to deposit with the superintendent of the school sufficient money to defray all expenses
 to be incurred, and should the pupils, or any one of them, fail to return to school at such time as may
 be agreed upon by the parents or guardian and the superintendent of the school in which the pupils
 are enrolled, the amount of money remaining with the superintendent, necessary to the return trans-
 portation of the pupil or pupils so neglecting to return, shall be forfeited to the Government; provided,
 however, that in all cases where it can be shown that there were justifiable reasons for the failure of the
 return of the pupil the forfeiture of the funds shall not take place.

If the pupil neglecting to return is from a reservation, the superintendent of the reservation shall
 certify to the reasons for the nonreturn of the pupil or pupils. If a pupil's home is not on a reservation,
 then the certificate of some reputable, disinterested citizen of the community may be requested as to
 the reasons for the nonreturn of the pupil or pupils.

Superintendent.



My dear Mr. Lipps:-

I am writing you in reference to Rosé and Lucy Sheridan. They were sent home on account of one of them not being very well and the other wanting to come with her sister. They are both in somewhat better health, but I think that they had better be kept in this climate. I, therefore, made application for their enrolment in Genoa, Nebraska, and would like to have you arrange for their release. They have been in your school two years. Their older sister Mildred will have to remain in the sanitorium permanently on account of her tubercular condition. She is home for a two week's vacation now and will return to Toledo soon. The application for the enrolment of both of these girls in Genoa, Nebraska, for a term of three years, is at present in the hands of the Superintendent at Macy, Nebraska.
