SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

My dear Mr. Brennan:

I am forwarding herewith at the request of Asa Thunder, a pupil enrolled at this school from your agency, a letter which he has addressed to you, requesting that the sum of \$25.00 be sent here for deposit to his credit.

Asa has had a very good record here until the past few months. He has been in trouble several times of late, the last offense being that of assaulting a small boy and almost killing him. It was the second time he had jumped on this same boy, and so we simply turned him over to the local authorities and he was tried and sentenced to ninety days in jail. I have just had him paroled with the understanding that if he misbehaved again he will have to serve out the remainder of the sentence. There was another boy in trouble with Asa in this matter and the Court costs amounted to \$17.98 each. Asa did not have any funds to pay his share of the cost, so Paul Red Star advanced the money for Asa, and if Asa has any funds to his credit with you, at least this amount should be transferred here, in order that he may reimburse the boy who loaned him the money to get him out of jail. Asa has promised me that

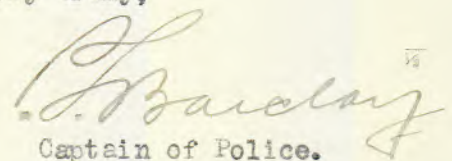
Dear Sir:

From the conversation our officer had with this young man, he learned that he is a runaway from your institution, and had been working on a farm in the vicinity of Glen Loch. Will you kindly advise if this young man is wanted by your institution, and also what disposition you desire to be made with him.

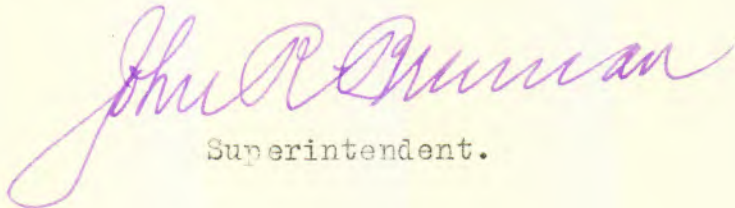

If the superintendent is of opinion from the information given that the pupil is entitled to enrollment he should so indicate by signing the blank in the proper place and filing in the individual pupil's folder. In the case of pupils concerning whose eligibility or need of Government aid there is some doubt, superintendents should make proper remarks and recommendations in the space indicated and forward the form to the Indian Office for consideration.
