My dear Sir:

This is to inform you that Eustace Edwards will leave here this evening for Anadarko. Transportation will be provided for his use.

Edwards is one of five boys who were found in an intoxicated condition in our Large Boys' Quarters on Monday evening of this week after the School Warehouse here had been burglarized and a quantity of lemon extract stolen therefrom. There was unmistakable evidence that he had been drinking the extract.

After a talk with him in my office yesterday he deliberately refused to perform the extra tasks that were assigned him and in spite of his protests that he did not know anything at all about the theft he again got drunk on the same stuff. As such action cannot be tolerated this summary dismissal from school has been made imperative.

Just as soon as I am advised what the cost of his transportation is I will ask you to co-operate with me to

secure that amount from funds to his credit under your jurisdiction. I believe that government funds should not have been expended to bring Edwards to Carlisle and I would thank you to advise me without delay whether he has sufficient funds now on deposit or coming to him in the near future from which the government can be reimbursed for the amount that was expended to bring him to Carlisle at the beginning of this school year.

I recommend that the charges referred to above be paid from his funds if it takes all the money he has to his credit.

INDIAN GETS 60 DAYS IN JAIL

But White Man's Case Is In Some Manner Adjusted

In United States District Court at Scranton this week a Carlisle Indian boy was sentenced to 60 days in Carlisle jail for buying whiskey at Harrisburg and furnishing it to boys here at the school. He had already served time in jail so that he has only thirteen days more to serve. Judge Witmer who heard the case gave as his opinion that it is not a good plan to put Indians in the jail, but that a better way would be to send refractory ones back to their homes.

My dear Mr. Stinchecum:

Eustace Edwards was released from the Cumberland County jail today, having served the additional period required to suffer confinement for a total of sixty days from the time his arrest was accomplished.

Last week I had a letter from Eustace requesting that he be allowed to have one more chance at Carlisle, so that he would not again have to go home in disgrace. It was at my suggestion that he came to see me at noon today and he repeated his request that he be allowed to remain. I want to help him because I realize that he will have no chance at all if he returns to his former associates on the reservation, and am willing to let him remain here as long as he shows the right attitude. I have told him that promises from him can no longer be relied on; that he will be allowed to remain only for the purpose of now showing that he is in earnest and that we can regain confidence in his desire to do what is right. In order that we may be protected and properly fortified it is desired

My dear Sir:

Eustace Edwards has recently been in Harrisburg without permission and while there endeavored to enlist in the United States Army for service in Mexico. When the recruiting officer referred the matter to me I stated that I should not interpose any objections to his enlistment, but that I believed his relatives should be consulted in the case. Eustace still desires to offer himself for enlistment and I have suggested that he apply at Fort Sill after his return home is effected.

For the reason that he has again indicated that he cannot be trusted to make good use of his time while at Carlisle it is being arranged so that he can leave here tomorrow evening for his home. A ticket for use to Anadarko will be provided and there is being enclosed herewith a check in the sum of \$109.58 which represents the entire balance he has to his credit in our school bank after the cost of his ticket is paid and he has been given an amount of \$10.00 to pay for his

Dear Mr. Stinchecum:

This is to acknowledge receipt of your favor of the 3rd instant, with which you forwarded a check in the amount of \$24.45 which is to be applied to the cost of the ticket that had to be provided for the use of Eustace Edwards when it became necessary last year to effect his dismissal from this school.

Referring further to your letter I beg leave to state that it would be an unusual experiment to allow the return to Carlisle of a young man of Eustace's age who had once been dismissed, but after careful consideration of the facts in the matter and the evident sincerity of the young man as evidenced by his willingness to reimburse the government for the amount that had to be expended to get him away from Carlisle, I have concluded that a chance will be given him if he returns here at his own expense for transportation.

I appreciate very much your attitude in the matter and believe with you that it may be well to let Eustace show that

he does want to be helped. I am sure you will take the opportunity to impress it upon him how much of a privilege is being extended him and that we will have every trust in him if he conducts himself here becoming a young man of his age and ability. 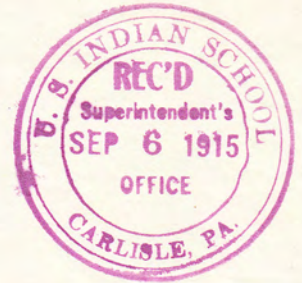

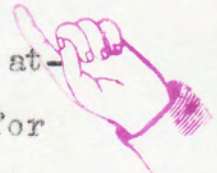

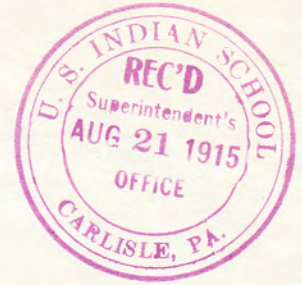

My dear Sir:

I am in receipt of a carbon of your letter of June 15th to Perry Kectah, who made a very earnest plea in behalf of Eustace Edwards, together with your letter of July 29, 1915, calling my attention to your letter of December 24, 1914 and January 6, 1915, relative to transportation expenses.

You are advised that Eustace recently came to this office in company with his father and I have talked over the matter of his reentering Carlisle very carefully. There seems to be no question but that this boy is in earnest and from all the information in my possession, he has conducted himself properly since he arrived here. I feel that it would be the proper thing for you to admit him again in order that he may have one more chance to prove up. I am persuaded to make this recommendation especially on account of the

fact that the father of this boy does not bear a very savory reputation himself and I am much afraid that if Eustace remains here that he will sooner or later succumb to the influence of his father and several years at Carlisle would enable him, if he is in earnest, to acquire sufficient strength to overcome the temptations which will beset him at his home.


The father of this boy is not a disreputable Indian but is addicted to the drink habit.

Referring particularly to your letter of July 29th concerning the transportation expenses, you are advised that I have discussed this matter with both the young man and his father and have proposed to them that the boy pay the expenses of his trip from Carlisle to Anadarko and the expenses of his return trip to Carlisle, provided he is again admitted. To this the young man readily agreed and if this meets with your approval, I shall be glad to take up the matter of reimbursing the school the amount necessary. Under this plan, Eustace would be penalized to the extent of the price of a round trip and the school would be charged with the expense of his original transportation to Carlisle, which, if he is re-admitted, would seem to be just and equitable.

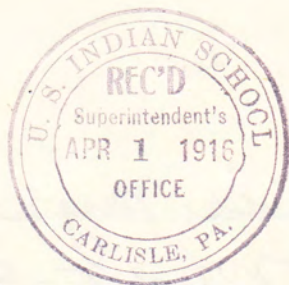

My dear Sir:

Referring further to my letter of December the 24th I respectfully state that the cost of transportation for Eustace Edward's passage from Carlisle to Anadarko has been charged to the account of this school in the amount of \$57.43. There was expended from government funds an amount of \$35.70 to pay for his transportation from Anadarko to Carlisle, so that a total amount of \$73.13 has had to be expended. On January the 6th of this year Superintendent Lipps had a letter addressed to Superintendent Stecker of the Kiowa Agency as follows:

"Referring further to my letter of December the 24th I respectfully state that the cost of transportation for Eustace Edward's passage from Carlisle to Anadarko has been charged to the account of this school in the amount of \$37.45. There was expended from Government funds an amount of \$35.70 to pay for his transportation from Anadarko to Carlisle, so that a total amount of \$73.13 has had to be expended.

My dear Friend:

I have received your letter of the 19th instant with reference to your desire that permission be given you to return to Carlisle, but must state in reply thereto that you cannot be allowed to do so.

I have not given up hoping that you will yet turn out to be the man you so generally are if you remain away from the influence of those who are less manly than you are, but at times you are not a good example to others and for that reason alone you should arrange with Superintendent Stinchecum to use your income in attending one of the Oklahoma state schools. The Agricultural College would be a good place for you. There you would associate with a class of earnest young men from country homes and their life should help you to keep away from liquor and to make good use of your time. Let me suggest, therefore, that you see Superintendent Stinchecum at once about the matter. Do not hesitate, however, to let me hear from you again if I can assist in any other way to place you in some school where you will be away from other Indian young men.
