**SPECIAL NOTE.**

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

*NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.*

# Read Instructions on this Application Blank carefully

## **INDORSEMENTS.**

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

My dear Sir:

I submit below for your information a copy of a self-explanatory communication that was received here this morning from the Office at Washington:

"Replying to your letter of April 11 in regard to Kintus Jim, it is suggested that you find work for him in some suitable situation and under proper surroundings whereby he can earn sufficient money to pay his transportation back to Washington. Of course so long as he is enrolled he should be required to deposit his moneys with you in order that they may be properly safeguarded. He should be retained at the school only so long as is necessary to enable him to return to his home."

My dear Mr. Wedsworth:

Kiatus Jim, a Yakima young man 24 years of age, arrived at Carlisle on Sunday evening of this week and requested permission to remain at Carlisle to take additional school work. He stated that he had come on to Washington with a party of Yakima Indians and that he came to the conclusion while in the east that it would give him a good opportunity to do more school work. He also stated that he has been a student at the Salem School and that he has been at work on his own ranch since his period of enrolment with you terminated.

Will you please advise me regarding the young man and whether it would be advisable to grant him his request? If there is any reason at all why the privilege of remaining at Carlisle should be given him I will ask the Office for the required authority to retain him here for such work as he can be given.

Assuring you that your prompt consideration of this

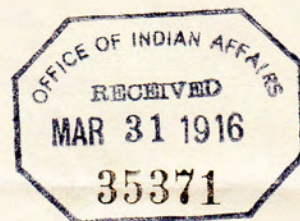

My dear Mr. Lipps:-

I have yours of February 29th relative to Kiutus Jim, formerly a student here, and replying will say this:

For several years Kiutus was very prominent in athletics in this school, and did very little else. Since the new plan has been adopted of having everybody doing good school work regardless of athletics, Kiutus did not take kindly to the plan, and the last year or so he was here, his work was entirely unsatisfactory. He ran away something over a year ago, and was brought to the school later. In June 1915 he went on leave and did not return. He therefore stands in relation to this school as runaway. He is not a desirable student to have in this school at least. Whether he has learned his lesson and will now be willing to make good if admitted to your school, I do not know. I think the chances are against it, but will leave that to your own judgment.

I am hearing all kinds of good reports of your work at Carlisle and feel that the school can surely be congratulated in having you straighten things out.

In reply to my letter to Superintendent Wadsworth of the Salem School regarding Kiutus Jim, of which a copy was mailed to you earlier this month, I have received a communication as follows:

"I have yours of February 29th relative to Kiutus Jim, formerly a student here, and replying will say this:

For several years Kiutus was very prominent in athletics in this school, and did very little else. Since the new plan has been adopted of having everybody doing good school work regardless of athletics, Kiutus did not take kindly to the plan, and the last year or so he was here, his work was entirely unsatisfactory. He ran away something over a year ago, and was brought to the school later. In June 1915 he went on leave and did not return. He is not a desirable student to have in this school at least. Whether he has learned his lesson and will now be willing to make good if admitted to your school, I do not know. I think the chances are against it, but will leave that to your own judgment."

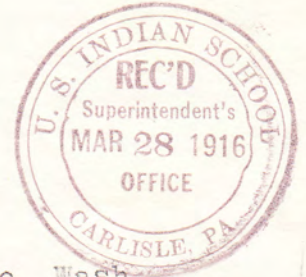
I have been favorably impressed with the young man's manner and want to give him a chance if I can do so consistently.
