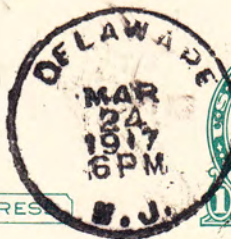
I enclose a check for \$28.42 which closes his account here. Will you please see that this check is turned over to him.
