SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

My dear Sir:

When your letter of the 16th instant was received here inquiry was made at once about the matter that was brought to your attention in a complaint filed by your ward, Nellie Brown. It was learned that Nellie has been impudent because she believes that you are paying for her tuition at this school and that she does not have to do as other girls are required to do. Such letters as the one you addressed to your ward on the same date mentioned above only encourage her to be more unreasonable in her requests and less grateful for the efforts that are made to help her. Your ward is a spoiled child and unless you can cooperate with us to make her do as all other girls are required to do it will be just as well to send her at once to some other school where she will have an opportunity to spend freely the money she is so anxious to use. You must understand that this school

is maintained primarily for those Indian boys and girls who are supposed not to have sufficient means to pay for their education elsewhere, and it cannot be necessary to add that special privileges cannot be allowed such girls as your ward who are too well aware of the fact that they have plenty of money.

Nellie is not at all a bad girl and we are anxious to do what we can for her here, but your cooperation must be extended if anything lasting is to be accomplished and she must not be aided and abetted in her desire to do as she pleases.

Will you let me hear from you regarding the matter, so that we can know definitely what your attitude is toward the training we will gladly give your ward if she is to remain as a student at Carlisle?

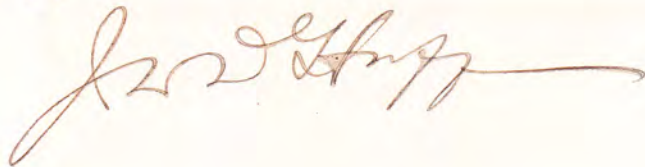

Mr. LIPPS:-

Here is a matter which I am going to let you settle with Mr. Sam T. Allen. I fear if I were to write him, I should be inclined to ask him to take Miss Nellie Brown out at once, unless he can make up his mind to support us in our efforts to make her respectful toward the matrons of this school. Please notice particularly his letter of October 16th herewith to Nellie. I don't know how this letter came to be in the possession of Mrs. Ewing; but it shows the kind of counsel Mr. Allen is giving the girl. If any other evidence were wanting, Mr. Allen's letter to Nellie would be sufficient to prove the very things which Mrs. Ewing alleges.

Mr.DeHuff:--

Regarding letter under date of Oct.16, sent by Mr.Allen Concerning Nellie Brown, will say that Nellie's conduct since returning here has not been satisfactory. Nellie is inclined to impudence. The first trouble occurred with the dining room matron on account of impudence and back talk. For days there were requests to have Nellie removed from that department, which we refused for it had been requested that she be taken from the sewing room and I did not want to put her in the laundry.

She resented being put in any department to work, saying she paid to come here and she thought she ought not to have to work

I, one day found her standing leaning over on the dining table eating cookies as the students were entering the dining room. She looked across at the boys flourished her cooky and acted very rude. ~~I~~ Immediately changed her to another table. She is now reported as doing much better in that department.

Nellie understands that no girl is to absent herself from assembly at 8:00 P.M. but she remained out one evening and when the girls were dismissed she came into the hall and called to Miss Knight, wanting her letter. Miss Knight sent her down stairs and Nellie impudently called twice in an undertone. The matter was reported to me and it was under my instructions that Nellie was put on punished list and deprived of the privilege of going to town Saturday P.M. and Saturday evening social until she showed a tendency to do right.

When I called for her to come into the office and read the letter to her she was very much inclined to impudence and I stopped her at once. In my talk with her I told her I thought she had been badly spoiled. She turned up her head saying in both an impudent and defiant manner, "I know I've been spoiled and seemed very proud of the fact. I think I took up an hour trying to show her she was leading out wrong finally telling her not to give me an answer as to what she intended to do until she took time to think it over but that if she stayed here she would be expected to be respectful and obedient and if she did not she would have to take her punishment just as the other girls do. It would injure not only Nellie but the other girls to keep up that idea, "I'll tell on you if you punish me".

When she received a letter from Mr. Allen this P.M., I called her to the office to read it. She read it and handed it to me in a very important manner. I think had she not gotten such ideas in to her head she might have been a very lovable girl for in many ways she is very nice. I think she needs to be guided very gently but firmly and it will be impossible to allow her to do different from the other girls.

I took her to town last week to select a bracelet watch. They had to send for one and we have ^{not} gone down since.

I also advised her that as she was not very rugged and having means with which to purchase any eatables market day, she might if she wished to, do so. I told her I would teach her how to prepare any thing she wished, until she was ready to enter Domestic Science.

She has not and will not be mistreated, but must obey.

Dear Nellie:

I have just written the Superintendent, asking him that he see that the matrons do not mis-treat you, and, of course, I do not want you to stay in Carlisle any longer than this year, unless you want to, but I believe if I were you that I would want to stay it out this year, at least, and then go to some other school, if you prefer.

They have written me, telling me that I must not send any more money direct to you. In fact the last time I sent you money they made a great "howl" about it, and said that it must come thru the hands of the Superintendent.

You have about \$65.00 to your credit there in the bank and I have told the Superintendent to let you have that for spending money. He has written a very nice letter, saying that he would see that you had it, and that you should have someone to go along with you and help you find a ring or watch, whichever you chose, and asking that you be urged to call at his office when you needed or wanted anything, or any information. If I were you, I would take up, direct with him, about how the matrons have been treating you, and when you need any money go to him and tell him you need it and draw checks on your account.

Your letter of the 11th inst., received and in reply beg to say that my ward, Nellie Brown is, at this time, very much dissatisfied, and is very often writing and complaining of the treatment she receives at the hands of the matrons. In her last letter she said that because she called one of the matrons that she had been denied the privilege of attending socials and going up town, and that the matron said that she was "smart".

Of course, I realize that very often students overdraw on their imagination, and think that they are being very much mistreated when, as a matter of fact, they are not, but I think that this should be seen into. She doesn't have any trouble at all it seems in her class rooms and gets along well with her teachers and the report cards sent out by the school show that her deportment is good. She is not a bad dispositioned girl and something must be wrong between her and the matrons, or she would not be complaining as she does.

She receives Mrs. Busby's allowance about \$5 every month from her guardian for spending money. Nellie feels this must be spent as Mrs. Busby has helped her in the selection of good useful articles. There is really no necessity for Nellie to have this money. It comes too easily to her for her own good. She could not be placed under more careful training now in a better home than Mrs. Busby's. It is a beautiful farm home near enough to town for school and church privileges, yet remote enough to keep Nellie's interest centered in the home and its surroundings. The Outing is the place for Nellie if she can be influenced to see it in that light. Nellie needs a good careful mother's care and attention to direct her overabundance of good spirits and superfluous energy. If Nellie's natural tendencies can be directed in the right way she will make a good woman.

VACATION REQUEST FOR PUPIL.

We, the undersigned, respectfully request that leave of absence be granted

Nellie B. Brown

from June 6th, 1916, to September 1st, 1916, to

enable her to visit her home. We hereby agree to pay all expenses, including round-trip railroad fares, sleeping-car fares, meals, lodging, stage fares, telegraph and telephone messages, and other incidental expenses connected with the visit. We further agree that said pupil shall be returned to the Carlisle school on or before the last day of the leave of absence.

We further agree to deposit with the superintendent of the school sufficient money to defray all expenses to be incurred, and should the pupils, or any one of them, fail to return to school at such time as may be agreed upon by the parents or guardian and the superintendent of the school in which the pupils are enrolled, the amount of money remaining with the superintendent, necessary to the return transportation of the pupil or pupils so neglecting to return, shall be forfeited to the Government; provided, however, that in all cases where it can be shown that there were justifiable reasons for the failure of the return of the pupil the forfeiture of the funds shall not take place.

If the pupil neglecting to return is from a reservation, the superintendent of the reservation shall certify to the reasons for the nonreturn of the pupil or pupils. If a pupil's home is not on a reservation, then the certificate of some reputable, disinterested citizen of the community may be requested as to the reasons for the nonreturn of the pupil or pupils.

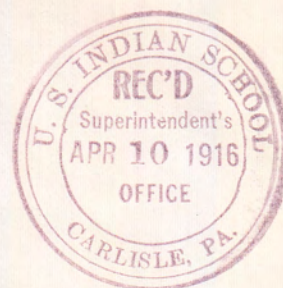

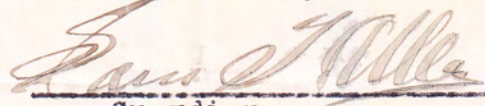
