Dear Mr. Lipps:-

On Tuesday of this week, I visited Olivian Arch living with Mrs. A. H. Holcombe, Cynwyd, Pa.

Olivian assures me that all is well with her. She has no cause for complaint in regard to her home. She speaks in kindly terms of all members of the family. Occasionally she gets out of sorts due to some little friction in performing her household duties.

I inquired particularly and definitely regarding the attitude of Mrs. Holcombe's seventeen year old son, Alexander, toward her. Olivian told me that she has nothing to say to him nor he to her, further than the greetings of the day, "Good Morning". There has been no joking, no fun-making, not the slightest familiarity whatever. Olivian says she is never left alone at night, that if Mr. and Mrs. Holcombe go out for the evening, Louise, a daughter of fourteen, is at home and Alexander usually goes to drive the car.

I inquired as carefully concerning the report that had gone to her home,—"that the same condition existed in the home as did when Lucinda Reed lived there".

Olivian says she did not write any such statement but did write to her sister-in-law that she was living in the same home where Lucinda Reed had lived, that she had heard through letters from home that Lucinda was telling that her country-brother was the father of her child and would she ask Lucinda if this were true and let her (Olivian) know the truth. Olivian says she also stated in this letter that she had nothing whatever to do with this boy nor with any of the delivery boys who came to the door and that she could take care of herself.

I told Olivian that we would not leave her nor any other girl in a home over night where we suspected any harm could come to her, that if at any time she needed protection, a call to Carlisle would be answered immediately.

Mrs. Holcombe was not at home on Tuesday but I am going to see her soon and take up the matter of Lucinda's rumors with her. I am sure Mr. and Mrs. Holcombe will take up the question with their boy and before any further steps are taken, I think it is best to await the outcome of this interview.

**SPECIAL NOTE.**

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.



## **INDORSEMENTS.**

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The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

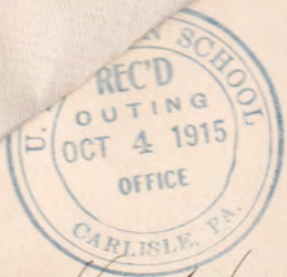



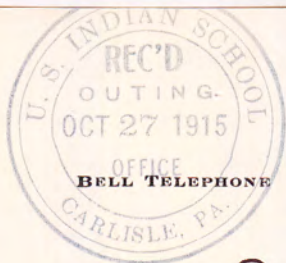

The father of Olivan Arch has requested me to ask you to allow his daughter to return home on account of the illness of his son Ross who was returned from your school about a year ago on account of ill health. He says that his wife is an inexperienced Indian woman who knows nothing about preparing food for a sick person and that if Olivan could be returned home she could nurse her brother until the end comes.

Should you decide to allow Olivan to return, I would suggest that you impress upon her the importance of returning to school after she is not needed at home as I fear that this is no place for her.
