SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

The enrollment of Indian pupils in nonreservation schools is governed by the "Rules for the Indian Service, 1913," sections 12, 13, 14, 15, 18, 19, 36, 112, 113, 114, 117, 118, 124 (b).

The Rules should be consulted before filling out the application blanks.

Dear friend:-

I write you again relative to the money due this school from an error made in your account a year ago.

I have been in correspondence with Mr. W. H. Woods, Probate Attorney, Durant, Oklahoma relative to your funds but it seems now that there is no way of getting this money which you owe except to wait until the suit for the recovery of your land is settled.

There is another way ~~which~~ we can get this money and that is by taking the matter up with the War Department and asking that you pay the debt from your salary. I dislike to do this however, as you have just gone into the Service and to do this might injure your chances for getting on in the Service. I hope it will not be necessary to do this and that you will arrange to pay this debt yourself. Let me hear what you will do so that I will know what to do.

Goode for the recovery of his land has not been settled and is still pending, and attorney in the case for Willie Goode has been notified of this indebtedness, so that same may be considered when suit is settled.

Inasmuch as this is a debt due a federal institution it might be possible to have Mr. Goode pay same out of his monthly salary earned as an enlisted sailor or soldier. Same might be taken up with the War Department.

A year ago when William F. Goode, a Choctaw pupil from your jurisdiction, left this school, he drew from the school bank \$75.00 more than was due him, owing to a clerical error. He was informed of the error and overpay a few days after he left but up to the present time we have been unable to get the amount overpaid from him.

I am in receipt of a letter dated October 17, 1917 from him in which he states that he will have to make arrangements with you to pay this and suggests that I write you about it. He says his guardian sold his land and he hopes to get something from the sale this year. William is in the Navy now stationed at Camp Paul Jones, Great Lakes, Illinois. Is there anything you can do to help us get this money ?

Dear Willie:

I am transmitting herewith blank application to be signed by you for the purpose of collecting your \$300.00 Choctaw per capita payment. This is made out on an adult blank because you are over eighteen and I am approving same as you will see my signature at the bottom of the sheet.

You will please sign on the line indicated by the pencil mark over the word "signature" on the application. Have one witness sign on the pencil mark on the left hand side of the page, giving his occupation and post office address.

You will note that I have directed that this amount be paid you through the Superintendent of Carlisle Institute. I am forwarding a letter of this date to the Superintendent of the Five Tribes advising him that the legal guardian has been suspended and also advising him that a suit is pending and judgment has been obtained against the guardian for mismanagement of this case and for that reason I have recommended payment direct to you.

The application has been filled out so as to show your correct name, age, roll number and address and you will have nothing to do except to sign the application and return it in the penalty envelope to the Superintendent at Muskogee, Oklahoma, after which check will be forwarded to you in due course in the care of the Superintendent of Carlisle Indian School. Copy of this letter is being forwarded to the Superintendent of Carlisle.

Dear Sir:

I am sending to Willie F. Goode, Choctaw minor, No. 10881, an adult application to collect his individual per capita payment of \$300.00. You are respectfully advised with reference to this case that J. C. Goode of Hugo, Oklahoma, has heretofore acted as guardian under appointment of the county court of Bryan County in a case which was transferred to Choctaw County. The County Court of Choctaw County upon a motion made by me as probate attorney suspended Mr. Goode as legal guardian and he has not been re-instated but even if he had been re-instated by the court I would be opposed to have this per capita payment paid him for the reason that I have sued him and obtained a judgment for \$600.00 and interest since October 1, 1909, in a case in which I alleged that he was guilty of gross mismanagement in office as such guardian. The jury returned a judgment in favor of Willie F. Goode, in the case entitled: Willie F. Goode, a minor, By: A. D. Tingle, as next friend, vs. J. A. Williams, Mary E. Williams, V. Bronaugh, Byrd Bronaugh, O. A. Simmons, Alberta Simmons, J. L. Adams, E. Pullen, Tennie Pullen, Columbus M. Reeves, Willie Reeves, J. C. Goode, J. D. Nickles, and the Commissioners of the Land Office of the State of Oklahoma, in the District Court of Bryan County, Oklahoma, being No. 2444.

I therefore respectfully recommend that payment be made direct to Willie F. Goode, in care of the Superintendent of Carlisle Indian School, Carlisle, Pennsylvania, in which institution he is now enrolled as a student.

I am forwarding a copy of this letter to the Superintendent of Carlisle for his information. I have written Willie F. Goode direct advising him that an adult application approved by me was being sent to him for his signature and use in the matter of procuring this per capita payment and he will forward same to you direct.

My dear Mr. Semple:

Your letter of February 23d has been received, and contents carefully noted. From the copy of the petition which you kindly sent for my information, it is quite evident that Willie Goode has been defrauded, in fact robbed. I had Willie in my Office yesterday afternoon, and talked the matter over with him. He appears to be a very bright boy and to understand the situation.

He brought to me the nomination of guardian which you had sent him and expressed a desire to execute the same, and I gave him 25¢ to pay the Clerk's fee and sent him to the court house in the town of Carlisle to subscribe and swear to the document, which I enclose herewith. Willie promised me that he would bring all letters and correspondence regarding this matter to me that he might receive and would sign no papers without first consulting me.

It is very kind in you to take such an interest in this matter for Willie, and he seems to appreciate it. I should be only too glad to cooperate with you in any way I

can to protect this boy's interests.

Dear Sir:

I am enclosing herewith a copy of a letter I have addressed to Willie F. Goode, and I wish you would consider this carefully and I desire to make this statement with reference to his case.-

Willie is enrolled as a Choctaw by Blood, and received an allotment of land in Bryan County, which is worth approximately eight thousand dollars. However, his brother, J. C. Goode, procured letters of guardianship for Willie Goode in 1907, and thereafter sold the entire allotment of land to some grafters for \$1100.00, and squandered the proceeds of the sale so that at this time Willie Goode has neither land nor money.

As United States Probate Attorney for the Choctaw Nation I have filed a suit in the District Court of Bryan County to recover his allotment and that case will be heard on the pleadings at the March term of the District Court of this county. I have a fairly good chance to recover the land. Inasmuch as Willie Goode is an unrestricted Indian the Department of the Interior declined to advance the funds with which to pay court costs and other expenses incident in conducting this litigation. There were no funds whatever in his guardianship case so I have paid these expenses out of my own private funds and will have to pay other expenses during the progress of this litigation.

I have a letter from Willie Goode in which he insists that he is without funds and is very anxious for me to help him out financially. He also sends me a letter he received from his brother and guardian, J. C. Goode, and in the letter this brother asks him if he authorized the institution of the suit which is pending to recover this allotment and seeks to get a statement from the boy stating that the suit was not authorized by him. This letter was prompted by the lawyers who are defending this case and they simply sought to get a statement from Willie to use against him in this case.

My experience in bringing these Indian land cases has taught me that it is the best policy to take precaution against efforts made by the defendants to procure dismissals and I wish you would talk to Willie in person and insist that he cooperate with me in my efforts to recover this allotment for him. I would be glad to send you the entire record in this case if you desire to go over the same and you will see from a hurried examination of the case that this boy has been badly mistreated by his guardian. A copy of my petition is enclosed herewith so that you may examine it and I would be glad to send you a copy of the entire guardianship record and the testimony I have heretofore taken in this guardianship case if you care to go over the same.

I think Willie is a good intelligent boy and I don't want to see him lose this case but he seems to be hard pressed for money and I feel that he might be induced to sign something which would jeopardize his interest in this case for the sake of procuring some ready money..

He has a sister whose allotment was sold by the same guardian under the same circumstances and to the same set of real estate operators and the suit filed to recover Willie's allotment has been brought in the name of A. D. Tingle, who is his brother-in-law and who is a resident of this county and whose wife's allotment was sold by the same guardian.

I am sending Willie a nomination of a guardian and I wish you would talk to him about the matter and advise him in the premises.

His brother, J. C. Goode, has never been removed as guardian although I have had proceedings instituted to remove him and have brought suit against him in the District Court of Bryan County and he should not be permitted to act as guardian when his interests are adverse to the interests of his ward, Willie Goode.

My dear Willie:

I am sending you herewith check for \$10.00, and I will say that this money is advanced out of my individual funds. I have suggested to your sister, Mrs. Jones, that she help raise some money for you and I have been unable to get anyone to advance any funds. I am loaning you this ten dollars because I realize that you are in a very embarrassing position with reference to money matters and you should use discretion in the use of same.

I am sending a copy of this letter to the Superintendent at Carlisle advising him that I am sending you this money and I will expect you to reimburse me for this money as soon as your guardian has funds on hand.

The case to recover your allotment is set for trial on the 30th of March and we intend to try the same provided that the witnesses are able to attend Court. Mrs. Tingle is sick and I also understand that Mrs. Jones is ill and unless they are able to be at court we will not reach the case at this term. I am hoping that they will recover sufficiently so that they will be able to be present so that the case can be tried on the 30th of March. If it is not tried at that time it will be laid over until July 1st. We have had one or two hearings on the pleadings and the Court overruled the demurrer of the defendants and required them to answer so that we will now be able to try the case on its merits. I have your letter of November 29, with reference to William F. Goode, who desires to leave Carlisle and who plans to finish high school and later attend the State College at Stillwater, Oklahoma. I note what you have to say about William's earnestness and the fact that he appears to have his future plans pretty definitely formed.

I have a letter from William also and he goes fully into his reasons for desiring to be released from Carlisle. He states that he is in the senior class but that he cannot graduate this year because of lack of sufficient training in the industrial departments. His statements, also, about desiring to make his own way without the assistance of the Government seem to strike the right key, and if he is in earnest about this matter I am disposed to encourage him in any way I can.

You are entirely familiar with the boy and his circumstances, and if you are favorable to his leaving Carlisle for the purpose of returning home and attending

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of the 26th of October, stating that William F. Goode, Choctaw 10881, left Carlisle Indian school last Spring and owing to a clerical error was allowed to draw \$75.00 more than was due him from the Carlisle School Bank, that Willie was informed of the error and overpay a few days after he left but up to the present time you have been unable to get the amount overpaid from him, and that he is now in the Navy stationed at Camp Paul Jones, Great Lakes, Illinois.

It appears that William F. Goode has not as yet collected his \$100 per capita payment due him as the 1917 per capita payment appropriated to the Choctaws, but it appears that there is \$30 due from him that was advanced by the Department for the purpose of filing a suit to recover his land, which suit has been appealed and nothing realized as yet.

I suggest that you take the matter of the \$75 due your school bank up with Superintendent Parker of the Five Civilized Tribes, inasmuch as the boy is 20 years old and has no court guardian, he could collect the money with the O.K. of the Department in his own name and inasmuch as he is in the Navy evidently would reimburse you for the overpay from this \$100 and endorse the other \$25 to the Department as part reimbursement for court costs advanced.
